

18 EIGHTH GRADE PUPILS GRADUATE IN TALENT SCHOOL

Eighth grade commencement exercises were held in Talent public school building Tuesday evening and enjoyed by a large number of parents and friends of the 18 graduates, three boys and 15 girls.

Decorations on the walls and platform of the stage were well planned by the class and very pretty in an artistic arrangement of the fronds of mountain ferns and mosses, interspersed with roses.

Miss Dorothy Baughman opened the program with piano music, and later gave two appropriate and pleasing vocal numbers, accompanied by Miss Esther Holdridge.

The speaker of the evening, A. C. Strange of the Southern Oregon Normal school, was introduced by O. H. Wilson, teacher of the class.

Mr. Strange's remarks to the class were brief, direct, and meaningful. He urged the pupils to gain as great an education as possible, and stressed the value of correct use of the English language, well enunciated. He said that gentlemen and gentlewomen are always courteous; he advised that pupils learn to do some one thing better than someone else has done it; to learn to do their own thinking; to learn a vocation; to study well how best to use their leisure time, and to continue to grow.

Principal Ashcraft of the Talent high school gave congratulatory remarks to the class, and welcomed them as next year's freshmen. He also introduced Fred Rapp, chairman of the board, who presented the diploma.

This class has the honor of standing high in the Stanford achievement tests, sent out by the county school superintendent's office. In closing remarks Mr. Wilson gave credit and expressed appreciation to the former teachers of these pupils for the excellent foundational teaching which they had done.

The pupils were presented with many beautiful bouquets, which were distributed by Miss Wisely and Miss McLarnin, members of the faculty.
