

# Four Records Fall as Portland High School Athletes Win Meet

## SOUTHERN OREGON ATHLETES SECOND IN STATE SCORING

### Century Dash Mark Tied By Klamath Youth — Roseburg Boy Sets High Jump Record At 6 Feet, 1 5/8.

CORVALLIS Ore. May 19.—(AP)—Four state records were smashed and another tied in the annual state high school track meet here today which district 8 (Portland) won under the new district scoring system. The Portland district scored 72 1/2 points, district 9 (southern Oregon) was second with 20 11-18 points, and district 4 (Lane and Douglas counties) third with 10 11-18 points. New marks were set in the shot put, high jump, 440 and high hurdles despite the handicap of a wet track and intermittent cold rain.

#### K.F. Boy Ties Record

The 100-yard dash record was tied by a new star from Klamath Falls, Bob Leslie, who overcame elements with time of 20 seconds to tie the Bob Grayson record made in 1932. Leslie also took first in the 200 dash and was on one of the winning relay teams to score high-point honors at 10 1/2.

Twenty-nine teams out of sixty-two entered scored points, while 62 of the 215 entrants in the meet broke into scoring column. Though no teams were awarded championships under new district rule, Washington and Grant of Portland led scoring with 21 11-18 and 20 11-18 points respectively. Klamath Falls with 14 1/2 was third and Roseburg fourth with 12 1/2.

Other teams scoring were Jefferson (Portland) 12; Chemawa, 7; Milwaukie, 7; Franklin, 6; Rosevelt, 6; Lincoln, 5; Forest Grove, 5; Sulverton, 5; Seaside, 4; La Grande 3 1/2; Bandon, 3; Pendleton, 3; Nyssa, 3; Springfield, 3; Cottage Grove, 2 1/2; Redmond, 2 1/2; Corvallis, 2; Eugene, 2; Chiloquin, Benson, Rogue River and Coquille one each, and Vale, Grants Pass and Albany one-ninth point each.

Other district scorings were: District 7 (Marion and Multnomah), 10; district 1 (Blue Mountain), 9 2/3; district 6 (lower Columbia), 9 2/3; district 5 (central Willamette valley), 2 1/2; and district 2 (central Oregon), 2 1/2.

#### Sharing Individual Honors with Leslie

Sharing individual honors with Leslie was Dufresne of Roseburg who set new high jump record at 6 feet, 1 5/8, and added points in two other events to take second at 8 1/2. Gilbert of Grant also was a three-event winner to get 8 points.

#### Mockingbird Seen Here
