"Death Takes a Holiday," at the Craterian Theater, is a rather daring picture. It will undoubtedly be one of the most discussed pictures since talkies came into vogue.

Here is a strange story: The Angel of Death takes on mortal form, living on earth for three days to dip into its fleeshpots in order to find out why mortals fear him so. It might be said to be a bit ghastly, but so beautifully has it been done, it is not ghastly. There is no gruesomeness. Rather it is a powerful, beautiful, romantic love story of the natural and super-natural. Likewise there is comedy contrast, resulting from the imagination-stunning situations and the sparkling dialogue. That it meets with approval can be had in the fact that the audience watches it in rapt attention.

The story has Death reincarnated as Prince Sirki (Frederic March). Only the Duke (Sir Guy Standing) knows his secret. Two women are drawn to him, but neither of them gives him what he is seeking.
