

### KELLY NOMINATED TO STATE SENATE ON DEMO TICKET

#### Write-in Candidate Gets 279 Votes As Party's Choice to Make Race Against George Dunn, Republican

Frank E. Anderson defeated Howard McKinney, for the Democratic nomination for constable, Medford district, by a majority of 38 votes, according to the official count completed this afternoon.

The final count was:

McKinney ..... 604

The Mail Tribune count on the race gave Anderson a lead of 38. It was the closest race of the primary.

Col. E. E. Kelly, veteran Jackson county attorney, was nominated for state senator on the Democratic ticket. Colonel Kelly and H. D. Brower were write-in candidates at the primary.

Brower received 69 votes and Kelly 279, according to the official count completed this morning. Kelly will oppose State Senator George W. Dunn of Ashland, Republican nominee, in the November election.

At the primary last Friday 8252 voters cast ballots. Assessor J. B. Coleman estimated there would be 9,000 voters if the sales tax wakes them up.

The official count for state senator shows that Senator Dunn of Ashland received 3244 votes and Victor Bursell of Central Point 1610, a majority for Dunn of 1634.

Bonnie Parker, Barrow's companion on many of his forays, was charged by officers with active participation in the gangway. She was believed to have been with Clyde and his brother, Marvin, when a posse cornered the gang near Dexter, Iowa, July 24, 1933. Clyde and Bonnie eluded officers, but Marvin was fatally wounded.

Photographs retrieved by officers from hideouts of the gang showed the Parker woman fondling high-powered firearms and smoking cigars. To an officer whom she and Barrow kidnaped and held captive for a time, however, Bonnie denied she was addicted to tobacco in that form. The pictures had been taken as a lark, she asserted.

### JOHNNY FISCHER, JACK WESTLAND LOSE IN BRITAIN

#### Goodman, Dunlap, Little and Guilford Gallop On in British Amateur — Two 18-Hole Rounds Next 2 Days

PRESTWICK, Scotland, May 23.—(AP)—Johnny Fischer and Jack Westland fell by the wayside today, but Johnny Goodman and George T. Dunlap, Jr. American open and amateur champions, respectively, and W. Lawson Little and Jesse Guilford galloped gayly on in the British amateur golf championship.

Fischer, the young Cincinnati star, lost a third round match to Jack McGee, young Scottish and Irish champion and the pride of Prestwick. Shooting sub-par golf, the local golfer established a lead of two up at the halfway mark and finally nosed out his opponent's rival by that margin.

Westland, a Chicago broker, lost to Roger Wethered, 1923 titleholder, three and two.

In order to catch up with the field, Goodman and Little each played two matches. Goodman defeated Capt. G. A. Rusk of St. Andrews by 5 and 3 in a second rounder, then took the measure of Sean Burke, the Irish champion, 4 and 3.

Little, who hails from San Francisco, won from Lester Rankin of Sunningdale, 5 and 3, and maintained almost the same pace against Eric McRivie, Scottish Walker cup player, who yielded on the 18th green.

Dunlap, who received scores in his first and second round matches, played close to the top of his game in his 5 and 4 rout of George D. Hanay, former French amateur champion.

Guilford, former American amateur titleholder, eliminated Lt. Col. T. J. Mitchell of Prestwick by a 6 and 4 toll.

Two 18-hole rounds will be played both tomorrow and Friday.
