

Rough Matmen Will Grapple at Armory Tonight

BELCASTRO AND HANSEN IN MAIN EVENT OF CARD

Sacramento Muscle Mangler Slated for Defeat, Is Fans' Belief—Indian and Miller to Put On Semi-Windup

Two of the roughest grip and grimace men in the game will get together in the main event of the mat card at the armory tonight when Pete Belcastro, tough and gory grappler from Sacramento, will tussle with big Charlie Hansen of Seattle, who knows a thing or two about toughness himself.

Pete is expected to be laid away by the Seattle boy, but may come through in the same unorthodox style that has given him the reputation of being one of the coast's scrappiest muscle manglers. Hansen is counted to go after the belligerent Italian with every trick of the trade he can remember and, judging from his reputation, he has a goodly assortment.

As Belcastro is unsatisfied with the refereeing of any local arbitrator and refuses to work with either Frisbie, Anderson or Bill Morgan, the main man in the ring, Promoter Mack Lillard has met his demands by securing Jack Mitchell of Seattle, himself a mat man, to keep the boys in bounds.

Pete has been giving all comers a roughing by fair means or foul, and last week took two out of the ring from the beefy Walt Strols, Frenchman, by using most of the foul portions of his wrestling technique. When he meets one of his own kind in the ring it will be no picnic, and fans are assured the roughest melee in many events at the local armory.

Chief Little Wolf, colorful Indian grappler from Colorado, will attempt to bring his clever "deathlock" to bear against Louie Miller of San Francisco. In his last appearance here two weeks ago, the warwhoop chief clapped two out of the ring on Bunny Martin of Oklahoma, and emerged from the fray without a scratch. He will be a hard nut to crack for the San Franciscan in the semi-final event of tonight's card.

The 30-minute curtain raiser will see Roland Warren, wiry rope wrestler from the local armory, tussle with Jack Morgan of Portland. Warren has gained the favor of Medford fans by his clean mat work and clever defensive tactics, and puts on a whirlwind of speed when the going gets rough.

FAMOUS RIDERS TO PERFORM IN JUBILEE RODEO

Riders, whose names are famous in rodeo circles, will take part in Oregon's Diamond Jubilee roundup in Medford during Jubilee week, from June 8 to 9. The roundup, one of the features of the celebration, will offer varied, competitive programs Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoon, followed by a special show Saturday night.

Holder of the world's championship for the best all-around cowboy, Clay Carr, Visalia, Calif., has entered the bronc riding, calf roping, bulldogging, and bareback bronc riding contests. While Carr is rated as one of the best, 25 to 30 other riders will offer him plenty of opposition in the numerous program events.

There is Chuck Wilson of Tucson, Ariz., holder of the Canadian world's bronc busting championship, who is coming to Medford determined to take a big share of the prizes. Like Carr, he has ridden in every major roundup in North America. Every name known to thousands of people, the array of roundup talent is impressive.

Kermit Maynard, brother of Ken Maynard of film fame, is expected to do some fancy roping and steer throwing. Buff Jones, Burbank, Cal., trick rider has agreed to compete in a number of events. Frank McCarroll is in the line-up for bulldogging, which he is capable of doing in 10 seconds and less.

Lloyd Saunders, Sonora, Cal., dexterous in the art of calf-roping, will demonstrate how easy it is to rope calves in less than 18 seconds.

The colored cowboy, Jesse Stall, Sacramento, Calif., will be on hand with his trained mule to add comedy to the show. Included among the numerous cowboys already entered are Perry Ivory, Alturas, Cal.; Pat Woods, Blackfoot, Ida.; Dolph Ager, Sheridan, Wyo.; Fox O'Callahan, Newhall, Cal.; Leonard Ward, Wellington, Ariz.; Jesse Stall, Sacramento and others.

MANY PRIZES WAIT SCATTER GUNNERS IN JUBILEE SHOOT

Trap Experts of Coast Expected to Enjoy Series of Events at Medford Gun Club Grounds June 3

Under the auspices of the Medford Gun club, the Oregon Diamond Jubilee trapshooting and skeet tournament to be held at the local gun club Sunday, June 3, will be one of the many varied events which will draw hundreds of visitors to southern Oregon to celebrate the 75th year of Oregon's statehood.

The program of events, as announced by Tournament Chairman T. E. Daniels, offers as the most coveted award, a \$50 diamond trophy, which will be a handsome gold medal set with a beautiful diamond, and engraved to meet the occasion. This trophy will go to the high amateur on combined score made on 100 16-yard targets and the 50 handicap targets shot at in the tournament.

Trap Layout

The Medford Gun club is known along the entire coast as having one of the finest equipped shooting grounds, and as the Oregon state shoot will be held at Portland, June 6, 9, and 10, just four days after the jubilee tournament, shooters will be afforded the opportunity of getting tournament practice as well as a chance to compete for the various awards.

The Medford Mail Tribune offers in events 1, 2, 3, and 4 the Mail Tribune trophy which has been in competition since 1920, and is now held by H. R. Turpin, who won it last year with a score of 98 for the 100 16-yard targets of the event.

Of the many other awards which will be offered, the jubilee grand trophy shoot will give five, in honor of O. N. Ford, for a mile-and-out event, 17 to 25 yards. The O. N. Ford trophy will go to the winner and the P. I. T. A. award to the second high score. Mr. Ford will present three other trophies to the 3rd, 4th, and 5th high guns.

A cumulative purse, perpetuated by Chester W. Wood, will be shot for in the 50-target handicap event. The first time winner will receive \$10 in cash, and the second time winner, \$20, the present value of the purse.

The Mendelian trophy, contributed by G. Mendelian, will be placed in competition along with the Mail Tribune trophy, to be shot for in the same events by amateur trapshooters other than A. class.

Robe for Pro Shooter

The Medford Gun club will present a fine Pendleton robe to the professional shooter making the highest score on 150 targets, including 100 16-yard and 50 handicap targets shot at on the program. Special trophies will be awarded to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd high guns, C and D class only, on the first 50 targets, in events 1 and 2.

A skeet event will be staged as a part of the regular program, and the Medford club has one of the best skeet layouts in the west, skeet shooters will be afforded real enjoyment during the tournament.

HIGHT PROTESTS SUNDAY GAME ON UNFAIR UMPIRING

League President A. C. Ninninger to Order Replay, if Affidavits Support Claim of Rogues' Manager

ASHLAND, Ore., May 24.—(Spl.)—Hal Haight, manager of the Medford Rogues in the Southern Oregon Baseball league, yesterday officially filed protest with A. C. Ninninger, president of the circuit, over the league game last Sunday at Klamath Falls, which Shaw-Bertram won by the score of 16-4.

Reasons given by Haight in his protest were that the umpire in chief, appointed according to league rules, by the home team, was incompetent and showed extreme partiality to the home team, Shaw-Bertram.

Ninninger immediately sent letters to disinterested persons in Klamath Falls who saw the game, for the purpose of acquiring affidavits.

May Order Re-play

In case affidavits are received from five persons in Klamath Falls that the game was handled in the incompetent manner Haight and Medford players and fans claim, Ninninger will rule that the game be replayed at the earliest opportunity.

For the game next Sunday, when Shaw-Bertram will journey to Jacksonville to play the Rogues, Ninninger has appointed Huff to the position of umpire in chief.

The game at Klamath Falls, from the third inning on, was played under protest, Haight filing with the umpire in chief.

Couldn't See Strikes

According to Medford players and fans, the umpiring was the worst that they had ever seen. They reported that a called strike was almost impossible for Medford pitchers to throw, no matter how near the center of the plate they came. Only when a Shaw-Bertram man would swing at the ball would it be called a strike, according to Medford players.

Continuous squabbling came to a head in the eighth inning when Cozzetto, Shaw-Bertram outfielder, hit Joy, Medford catcher, with a baseball bat when Joy furiously protested an alleged perfect strike thrown by Hughes, Medford pitcher.

Haight also got hit, as did a policeman, before Cozzetto could be ejected from the game.
