

### MEMORIAL POPPY RECALLS TRAGIC SCENES TO VETS

The memorial poppies which the women of the American Legion Auxiliary are distributing here today and Saturday recall vivid pictures to the minds of World War veterans who served overseas, according to Captain C. L. Overmyer, commander of Medford post of the American Legion. The poppies blooming amid the waste and destruction of the battle front, and among the bare graves of the dead, left an unforgettable impression on the American soldiers, he said.

"When the American divisions drove forward in the great offensive of 1918, they entered a region in torn, desolated and trampled by the most tremendous battles of history. Destruction and death were everywhere, but amid it all the little wild poppies bloomed on. When machine gun and shell fire took its toll from the American ranks, the poppy was nature's floral offering on the graves of the dead. To us those poppies seemed to symbolize the brave spirit of our fallen comrades and when we returned home we made the poppy the memorial flower of the American Legion."

Poppies to be worn in tribute to the men who gave their lives for America in the World War are to be offered on the streets throughout the city today and Saturday, by the American Legion Auxiliary women. Men of the Legion are co-operating in the promotion of the project. The poppies, paper replicas of the flowers that grew on the battle fields, have been made by disabled veterans at Portland Veterans' hospital. All contributions received for the poppies will be devoted to the rehabilitation and welfare work of the legion and auxiliary among the disabled veterans and the dependent families of veterans.

### GOVERNOR TO BE JUBILEE SPEAKER

Arrangements have been completed for Governor Julius Meier to present the principal address of Thursday, June 7, in Jacksonville during Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration next month. Governor Meier has chosen an appropriate subject for the speech to be given from the steps of the old county court house. A complete program has been outlined for the historic mining town which will offer exhibits of old-time relics. The displays will be open the entire week in conjunction with specially guided tours to points of historical interest in the old settlement, which continues as one of the most ideal residential sections in Oregon. Numerous program features are planned for the week, attracting thousands of visitors to this section of the Rogue River valley, less than five miles from Medford.

### \$665 SPENT FOR MARTIN CAMPAIGN

SALEM, Ore., May 25.—(AP)—Expenses of the campaign for Charles H. Martin for the Democratic nomination for governor, amounting to \$665.50, have already been listed with the secretary of state. This sum was spent in behalf of Martin by E. W. Hagood.

Robert N. Stanfield expended \$1,035.23 in his unsuccessful campaign for the Republican nomination for congress from the third district, the expense reports filed today revealed. Other filings among the larger items included the following:

Oscar W. Horne, in behalf of C. H. Gram for the Republican nomination for labor commissioner, \$139.90; Walter L. Tooze, Republican, for representative from Multnomah county, \$138.10; J. C. O'Neill and Hardin C. Blackmer, Republican candidates for district attorney of Klamath county, \$92.25 and \$238.65, respectively; Chas. W. Ellis, circuit judge of the ninth district, \$155.28.

### COMMISSION ASKS UNDERPASS BIDS

SALEM, May 25.—(AP)—Bids on the last two bridges along the Oregon coast highway will be opened by the state highway commission at its next meeting in Portland, June 7, it was announced here. The two, across the Siuslaw at Florence, and across the Umpqua at Reedsport, will total in excess of \$1,000,000.

In addition, the commission will open bids on seven other projects, amounting to about \$200,000, including the bridge at Mill City on a county road which will be paid for out of roads funds of Marion and Lane counties. Inter-county span over the Santiam highway will cost about \$40,000. Other jobs for which bids have been called include:

Undercrossing of the Pacific highway near Ashland in Jackson county. Construction of a frame storage building for maintaining patrol station at Grants Pass.

### ASHLAND TO LEVEL HIGH SCHOOL FIELD

ASHLAND, May 25.—(Sp.)—Eighteen men will be put to work on the high school athletic field project here Monday, May 30, according to officials handling the project. The leveling of the athletic field

will require eight weeks and will entail an expenditure of \$2275 by the SERA. Two crews of 18 men each will alternate on this project every two weeks.

The Normal school project under the SERA will start immediately af-

ter graduation. This is a painting and renovating job which will employ five men.

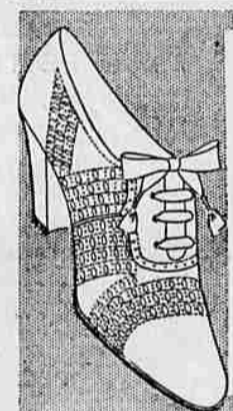
