

DECORATION DAY PARADE TO FORM 9:30 WEDNESDAY

Annual Exercises Honoring Soldier Dead Will Be Held In City Park Following March—Memorial At Cemetery.

Stores Closed Wednesday In keeping with long established custom, Medford business houses will be closed all day Wednesday, May 30, in observance of Memorial day.

By W. H. Paine A street parade will be formed at Medford city park at 9:30 a. m. and will move on Main street to Bear Creek bridge, where it will be halted and there will be:

1. Invocation.
 2. Strawing of flowers on the water in honor of the memory of comrades who have given their lives for our country in its service on the oceans, lakes and rivers.
 3. Firing salute.
 4. Taps.
- The parade will then return via Main street to city park, where the following exercises will take place:
1. Call to order by Comrade William Colvig, past commander, Department of Oregon, Grand Army of the Republic.
 2. Singing by children's chorus of Washington school.
 3. Invocation.
 4. Reading of orders, including General Logan's Memorial day general order.
 5. Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, by Comrade William Colvig.
 6. Decoration of vacant chairs by representatives of veteran and patriotic organizations in honor and in memory of comrades who are in their final earthly rest.
 7. Addresses by Rev. Jos. Knott and Attorney Don R. Newbury, both of Medford.
 8. Music.
 9. Benediction.

If the weather is stormy the program intended for the park will be held in the Presbyterian church. All fraternal, civic and improvement societies and organizations of this community are cordially invited and urged to take part in the street parade and they and the general public are invited and urged to attend the exercises to follow it.

The Women's Relief Corps and the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War will serve a covered dish luncheon for the veterans of the Civil War and for their own members at Medford Presbyterian church at noon.

The Relief Corps and Daughters of Veterans will conclude a memorial ceremony at Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery at 2 p. m. Decoration day. All members of other veteran and patriotic organizations and the public are invited to be present and to witness this ceremony.

MISS HOLLENBECK OF MEDFORD HIGH WINNER OF ART SCHOLARSHIP

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, EUGENE—(Special)—Miss Louise Hollenbeck, teacher of art in the Medford high school, has been awarded a summer scholarship in the Carnegie Art Center of the University of Oregon. She is one of twenty-five art teachers in the Pacific northwest to receive this recognition and opportunity.

For several years the Carnegie corporation has made a grant of several thousand dollars to each of the two art centers in the United States—one at Harvard university and one at the University of Oregon. At Eugene, courses are offered in applied design, painting, composition, art teaching and art appreciation. The visiting professor is Dr. Eugen Gustav Steinhilber, director of the National School of Decorative Art in Vienna.

All of the courses of the art center are open to those enrolled in the university summer session. Those receiving scholarships have their expenses paid. This is the first year scholarships have been granted to public school art teachers, being previously restricted to art instructors in colleges, normal schools and universities.

CAMPAIGN OPENS FOR HOUSING OF JUBILEE THROUG

The advance guard of the thousands of visitors expected in Medford and Jacksonville for Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration next June 3 to 9 are beginning to arrive in Medford. A special committee is completing preparations to provide for the housing of the expected throngs.

While hotels, rooming houses and auto camps will provide for the needs of many visitors, efforts have been underway for some time to contact all residents having extra rooms which could be used for the benefit of persons unable to obtain accommodations at hotels. Reports have been constantly received of the arrival and expected arrival of visitors from numerous distant points to participate in Oregon's birthday celebration.

While Jubilee week was primarily inspired by the opportunity of statehood anniversary observance and the payment of homage to the pioneers of long ago, the week will be without dull moments. Entertainment of the kind that thrills will be found in Oregon's Diamond Jubilee roundup, presented for four afternoons for cash prizes in bull-dogging, steer roping, broncho riding, bareback bronco riding and other contests.

Four official Jubilee dances will be presented Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, with other dances scheduled for Monday and Tuesday. An Indian village, with real Indians living as they did 100 years ago, will be featured, as well as one of the best carnivals in the west.

An aviation show on Saturday, with scores of ships arriving from the northwest and California, will be another noteworthy attraction, with special stunts presented throughout the day. There will be special attractions in Ashland on Education day, Tuesday, June 5, followed by special attractions in the historic gold mining town of Jacksonville, Thursday. A pageant, "Over-Under," depicting Oregon history, will be presented Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings.

LEGION TO PLAN MEMORIAL MARCH

An important meeting of Medford Post No. 15 of the American Legion is scheduled for tomorrow night at the Armory. Final arrangements for the observance of Memorial day will be made and every Legionnaire is urged to plan now to march in the parade to pay homage to his departed comrades.

Plans for the Legion caravan to Klamath Falls Tuesday, will be discussed during the evening. This important caravan to advertise the Diamond Jubilee in Klamath has been turned over to the local Legion post and every effort will be made to assure its success. Present plans are for a big parade in Klamath Falls Tuesday evening with the Medford Legion drum corps, a steam calliope, loud speaker equipment and other novel features to publicize the jubilee.

An invitation from Grants Pass post to participate in the big 4th of July celebration in the "Climate city" has been received and will be discussed and acted upon tomorrow night.

Several other matters of importance are scheduled and Commander Overmeyer urges every Legion member to be present.

JUBILEE CARAVAN TO KLAMATH PLAN

All local citizens are urged to participate in the Legion caravan to advertise the Diamond Jubilee in Klamath Falls Tuesday evening. A large number of cars are needed in order to make an impressive showing in the Klamath metropolis and all who plan to go should phone Horace Bromley, chairman of the caravan committee or Lee Garlock at the A. A. A. office. Those wishing transportation should also report to either of the above Legionnaires. Present plans call for assembly at Jubilee headquarters at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday to secure placards and advertising material and the caravan will move promptly at 3 p. m. Plenty of music has been secured for the parade in Klamath and includes the Legion drum corps, a steam calliope and loud speaking equipment. It is also planned to take along the \$10,000 Brahms bull from the Jubilee rodeo to put on an exhibition of high jumping for the Klamath citizens.

Grand prizes will also be offered for the best display of rabbit fur articles, best fur robe, best display of tanned rabbit fur, best mink hide, best blue fox hide and Fitch hide.

URGE ALL ENTRIES PIONEER PARADE BY MONDAY NIGHT

All entries in the pioneer parade, one of the outstanding features of Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration, must be registered no later than Monday night, May 28, according to J. Verne Shingle, parade chairman.

Anyone who plans to participate in the parade must be formally entered by Monday night in order that the parade may be chartered and the entries numbered for the programs. Entries may be made at the Jubilee headquarters or with Mrs. C. L. Hopkins, of the parade committee, who can be reached at the Firestone Service Stores.

A complete listing of the parade will appear in the Medford Mail Tribune at a later date and all who plan to witness it are urged by the committee to procure a copy so that every detail of the mammoth spectacle will be interpreted for them.

Although entries will be accepted later than Monday night, they cannot be numbered and given favored positions.

The parade is rapidly rounding into shape and promises to be one of the greatest shows of its kind ever staged on the coast. Unlike many parades which are assembled without "rhyme or reason," the Jubilee's pioneer parade will be a marvel of pageantry and will portray Oregon history, beginning with Captain Gray's discovery of the Columbia river, to the birth of the state in 1859.

The Lewis and Clark expedition alone will utilize 50 men in costumes, while the wagon train will number more than a dozen genuine "prairie schooners" and covered wagons. The floats, depicting the highlights of Oregon history, are now being constructed and those who have seen them are enthusiastic over their faithful portrayal of the colorful historical events.

The parade will be staged Thursday morning, June 7.

OREGON BUSINESS IN APRIL SHOWS SEASONAL GAINS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 26.—(AP)—Reports from 115 Oregon firms indicate, the federal reserve bank here said today, "that industrial employment and payrolls in that state increased by about the customary amount during April."

The bank survey revealed activity expanded less than the full seasonal amount in the important lumber and wood products industries, but "increases in the number of employees and payrolls in the textiles and food products groups were larger than in most recent years."

It was also found that average weekly earnings were somewhat larger than in March. The bank's index of employment indicated Oregon industries showed 70 per cent of the 1926 monthly average at work, compared with 66 in March and 61 in April last year. Payrolls were 65 per cent of the 1926 average, compared with 49 in March and 52 in April last year.

FINANCE CHIEFS PAY CITY VISIT

H. G. Snodgrass, president, and W. Blackburn, vice president, of Mercantile Acceptance Corporation of California, both of whom are officers of the Commercial Finance corporation, spent Friday in Medford going over the company's affairs and discussing the automobile finance business in this territory.

Mr. Snodgrass commented on the general improvement in business which was of considerable interest to the Commercial Finance corporation stockholders in this territory. The volume of the Mercantile Acceptance Corporation of California, including its subsidiary Commercial Finance corporation is now running at the rate of approximately \$800,000 a month or better than \$10,000,000 a year as compared with a volume of approximately \$4,500,000 for the entire year of 1933.

PASTOR'S SON TO OCCUPY PULPIT

Martin G. Kabele, son of the local pastor of Zion English Lutheran church, will conduct the entire service in place of his father on the Sunday of May 27th.

Martin Kabele has just completed a year of work at the Chicago Lutheran seminary, which is now situated in Maywood, Ill. The Lutheran church requires at least three years of post-graduate work in their seminaries, after the student has earned his degree of A. B. This is the second time he has occupied his father's pulpit, the first time this year.
