Missionary Council Meets with President

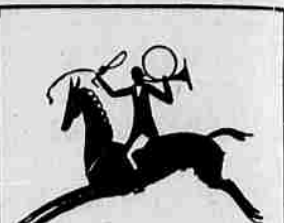
