

M'LEAN'S BIG BAT GIVES ROGUES 9-4 WIN OVER SHAWS

Medford Catcher Pounds Out Triple, Double and Single — Errors Hurt Millmen Although Pitchers Stingy

Cliff "Chief" McLean batted the Medford Rogues to a sparkling 9-4 victory over the Shaw Bertram Lumber Co. team from Klamath Falls yesterday at Jacksonville in a Southern Oregon league game, which saw players of both teams completely docile, in direct contrast to the affair in Klamath last week.

McLean came out of a batting slump which had netted him but three hits in five games, to hammer out a triple, double and single and drive in five of the nine Medford runs.

Jack Hughes, on the mound for the Rogues, was touched for 10 hits, but great fielding plays pulled him out of several bad holes.

Stanisha, Shaw Bertram hurler, allowed only five safeties in the seven innings that he worked, but errors, three of them by Shipman in center field, proved his downfall. Gilman pitched the final frame for the Lumberites and gave up three runs without the aid of a hit.

Hoffard and Conlin, Medford outfielders, both pulled circus catches and Haight came up with a great play on Shipman's drive through the box in the fourth.

Shaw Bertram counted twice in the first on Wakeman's homer to right with Donaldson on base.

Medford came right back in their half to score four times. A walk to Joania, errors by Shipman, Cozzetto and Cogan and singles by McLean and Haight made up the runs.

Medford led the game in the eighth by scoring three times on two walks, a passed ball and two errors.

With the exception of a lukewarm argument in the seventh inning when Diehl called Cozzetto out at first on a close play, players of both teams accepted the officials' decisions without a murmur.

SKIDDING YANKEES RELINQUISH LEAD TO CLEVELANDERS

Hitting and Hurling Slump Is Climaxed by 16 to 7 Defeat Sunday at Hands of the St. Louis Browns

(By HUGH S. FULLERTON, JR., Associated Press Sports Writer) The slump of the New York Yankees had carried them today out of the lead for the first time since the end of April, while the consistent Cleveland Indians had replaced them at the head of the American league.

Leaving home with a 4½-game lead over the Indians, the Yanks began to slip both in hitting and pitching. One of their most dramatic performances came yesterday when they collected ten hits and eleven walks off Buck Newsum and still dropped a 16-to-7 decision to the St. Louis Browns. It was the Yanks' eighth defeat in 11 games.

Cleveland came from behind to beat Philadelphia, 7 to 4, after the A's had scored five runs in the first. Two other battles for places in the standing remained drawn as Detroit trimmed the Boston Red Sox, 9 to 2, and Washington outslugged Chicago, 9 to 6.

The St. Louis Cardinals provided another of the almost-daily changes in the National league standing when Dizzy Dean led them to a 5-to-2 10-inning victory over the Phillies that returned the Cards to second place. Dizzy not only pitched eight-hit ball but hit a homer in the tenth to start the winning rally. Chicago's Cubs couldn't touch Huck Bates' pitching, were shut out, 5 to 0, and dropped a full game away from the lead and a half game behind St. Louis.

Pittsburgh's pace setters smashed young Al Smith for four runs in the first inning, when Tus Suhrt hit the first of two homers, and went on to trounce the Giants, 7 to 3, behind the five-hit fling of Red Lucas.

Van Mungo, Brooklyn's ace, limited the Reds to six blows, to give the dodgers a 5-to-0 decision.

PORTLAND, May 28.—(AP)—University basketball, golf, tennis and swimming schedules were adopted, and rules established for track, baseball and basketball in the opening day's meeting of coaches and graduate managers of the northern division of the Pacific coast conference here yesterday.

SCRIBE SLUGGED WHILE SLEEPING

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., May 28.—(AP)—Spurred on by the offer of a \$500 reward from the publisher of the Santa Barbara Press, city and county peace officers searched today for a man who stole into the home of Stanley Selover, 28, Press reporter, and beat him, probably fracturing his skull.
