COURT AFFIRMED IN NALLEY CASE

On an appeal, the state supreme court today affirmed the decision of Circuit Judge James T. Brand, in the will contest of the Anna C. Nalley estate. The lower court held that Nalley had no interest in the property of his deceased wife.

Nalley held that there was an alleged oral agreement between him and his wife, whereby upon the death of either, his or her property would revert to the other. The couple, however, were divorced.

The high court held with the lower court, in an opinion by Justice Harry H. Belt, that Nalley had no interest in the Anna C. Nalley estate.

The action is one of several legal suits instituted in connection with the settlement of the estate.

Give Rules, Regulations Medford Flower Show

Mrs. Louis Salade, Jr., general chairman for the flower show to be given Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of Jubilee week announces the rules and regulations for the show as follows:

1. All entries must be in by 11 a. m. Wednesday. Doors to be closed at that time Wednesday, June 6.
2. There will be only one judging of exhibits and that on the first day of the show.
3. All furniture and accessories competing in class IX must be placed the previous day if possible.
4. All flowers shown by amateurs must be given by exhibitor except in classes VI, VII, VIII, IX and XI.
5. In all other classes exhibits must be by amateur growers. By the term "amateur" is understood a person who maintains a garden with a view to his own use and enjoyment, and not for gain or profit.
6. In classes covering artistic arrangements, exhibitors must furnish their own containers and arrange their own exhibits.
7. Exhibitors must state to which class each entry belongs, but the judging committee has full power to change in correct classification.
8. All roses exhibited in competition must be from plants which have been grown by and have been the exclusive property of the exhibitor for at least two months immediately preceding the exhibition.
9. Two or more persons may not exhibit in the same division from the same garden.
10. Where a certain number of roses is designated, there must be neither more nor less than that number entered, in said division.
11. Ribbons on baskets disqualify exhibits.
12. All roses must be correctly named as otherwise the exhibit may be disqualified, at the discretion of the judges.
13. Exhibits cannot be removed before 8:30 a. m. Saturday, June 9. Flowers to be returned to exhibitor when desired, otherwise they will be distributed to those calling for them.
14. Exhibitors may not disturb or remove exhibits without permission of staging committee.
15. The flower show will be formally opened at 2 p. m. Wednesday, June 6 and continue open until a late hour Friday, June 8.

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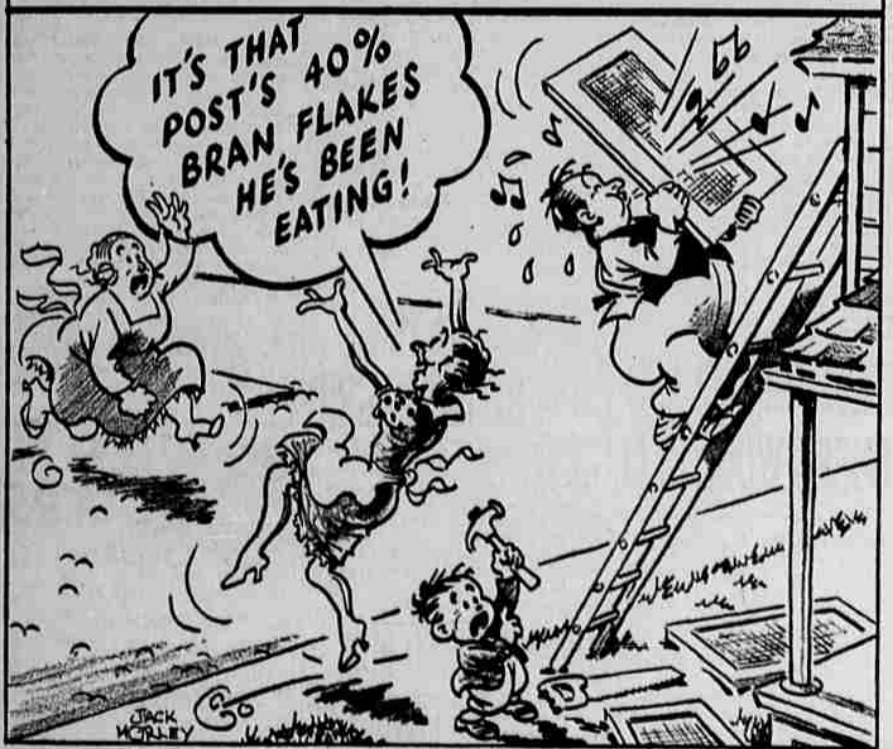

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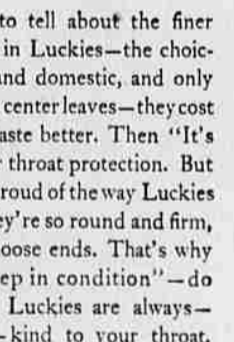
