

### SPECIAL DISHES TO BE FEATURED THURSDAY SCHOOL

"And he'd better bring an apron and a measuring cup," smilingly added Estelle Calkins, personal representative of Julia Lee Wright, director of the Safeway Stores Homemakers' Bureau, as she prepared for the second day of "Kitcheneering" at the Rialto theater which is to feature a number of "mystery" dishes.

"Generally speaking, our program for Thursday is to be devoted to cakes and dishes for entertainment," explained Miss Calkins. "The much discussed 'mystery' portion of the program is the result of two special dishes which were developed in the Homemakers' Bureau testing kitchen and which are to be demonstrated from the stage of the Rialto.

"One of these is 'Goop.' It's an odd name, an odd dish, in fact, but very, very delicious. 'Goop' was perfected by one of our own home economists and when served with a platter of salad and perhaps a few slices of garlic bread, it constitutes a meal in itself. But I'm not going to explain all the mysteries of 'Goop' now, you'll have to attend our interesting session today to become a real 'Goop' expert.

"The second big mystery of the day will be a demonstration of a new, original cake appropriately named 'Mystery' cake. This is really nothing complex about it but I am sure you would be tremendously amused if you knew two of the ingredients used."

Cakes are destined to receive considerable attention during the second session of "Kitcheneering" in Medford. Estelle Calkins said that one of the featured events will be a demonstration of an easy method to make sponge and angel food cake as developed by the Homemakers' Bureau during the last year.

Miss Calkins declared that she was highly gratified with the response accorded the first session of "Kitcheneering" here. Congratulations were heaped upon her by an enthusiastic audience as she brought the program to a triumphant close this afternoon.

"I hope that many of the Medford homemakers who were unable to attend our first session will be at the Rialto Thursday," she said. "The Safeway Stores Homemakers' Bureau has devoted months of effort and patient research as a part of the preparation of the Medford course in 'Kitcheneering.' It has been designed to answer the demands of modern women. Fundamentally the purpose of 'Kitcheneering' is to teach Western women the modern art of preparing and serving well-balanced and economical meals with a minimum of time and energy. We have planned our 'Kitcheneering' programs so that every minute is highly interesting and educational."

The third and final session of "Kitcheneering" here promises to be a fitting climax with the program devoted to complete meals. An interesting discussion and demonstration of every phase of stove usage, involving both surface and oven at high and low temperatures will also be included on the last day.

"At the start of the 'Kitcheneering' course we promised to demonstrate more than 85 recipes, and I'm sure our audience will find us more than making good this promise on the final program," stated Miss Calkins.

"Friday afternoon we will demonstrate the bureau's method of making a delightful Porto Rican rot roast which is served with German potato pancakes. We will also feature a number of choice breakfast dishes, including fluffy French toast and 'baked humpty dumplings.'

"It's really difficult to briefly tell you all the many surprises and innovations we have planned for the final two days of the 'Kitcheneering' course. I'm sure every homemaker who attends will find every session actually exciting and well worth while. Once again, I want to warn homemakers to bring a pencil and paper to the 'Kitcheneering' sessions. Our audience always find there are hundreds of thoughts and hints they want to jot down."

As on the opening day, the doors of the Rialto will be opened at 1 o'clock to accommodate early arrivals. The sessions on the latter two days will also start promptly at 2 o'clock. Admission, of course, is free of charge.

### APPLIGATE WILL DEDICATE BRIDGE TO THE PIONEERS

In keeping with the anniversary spirit of Oregon's statehood the Applegate community is preparing to pay tribute to its own pioneers next month when the new steel bridge at the Applegate store will be dedicated. The new bridge itself marks a long step in progress since the Applegate first was spanned at this same loca-

tion about 1872, even before Rogue river afforded a crossing. Applegate's first bridge was built by the late Thomas Mee, who also constructed the first bridge across Rogue river in 1876, located at Rock Point and called the Centennial.

Mrs. Louisa Ray of Ruch, 87, who came west from Illinois in 1853 and was married in Jacksonville 19 years later, has accepted the honor of presiding at the dedication ceremonies. Mrs. Ray is the only surviving Grandmother of the '70s, and has been a resident of the Applegate longer than any other woman.

According to plans made by committees appointed in the Applegate Grange and Home Extension unit, the dedication date has been scheduled for Saturday, June 23, when the structure, to be named the Pioneer bridge, will be dedicated to the pioneers of the Applegate. Two prominent speakers have been secured for

the program, C. E. (Pop) Gates of Medford, and Professor Taylor, historian from the Southern Oregon Normal school, who has made extensive research and study of the early history of the west. Members of the Medford Chamber of Commerce also have offered their services in the program. Pioneers of the Applegate will be asked to participate in the program by giving a few words concerning early days. A Grants Pass band has been secured, and there will be community singing of patriotic songs. The program will begin early in the afternoon, following a community picnic.

A committee is investigating the cost of a bronze plaque to bear the name of the bridge, the installing of which is offered free by the state highway commission. The committee in charge of the dedication expect to sponsor a dance at the community hall on the evening of June 23, the

proceeds of which will be used for purchase of the plaque.
