CALL JUBILEE CHOIR REHEARSAL THURSDAY

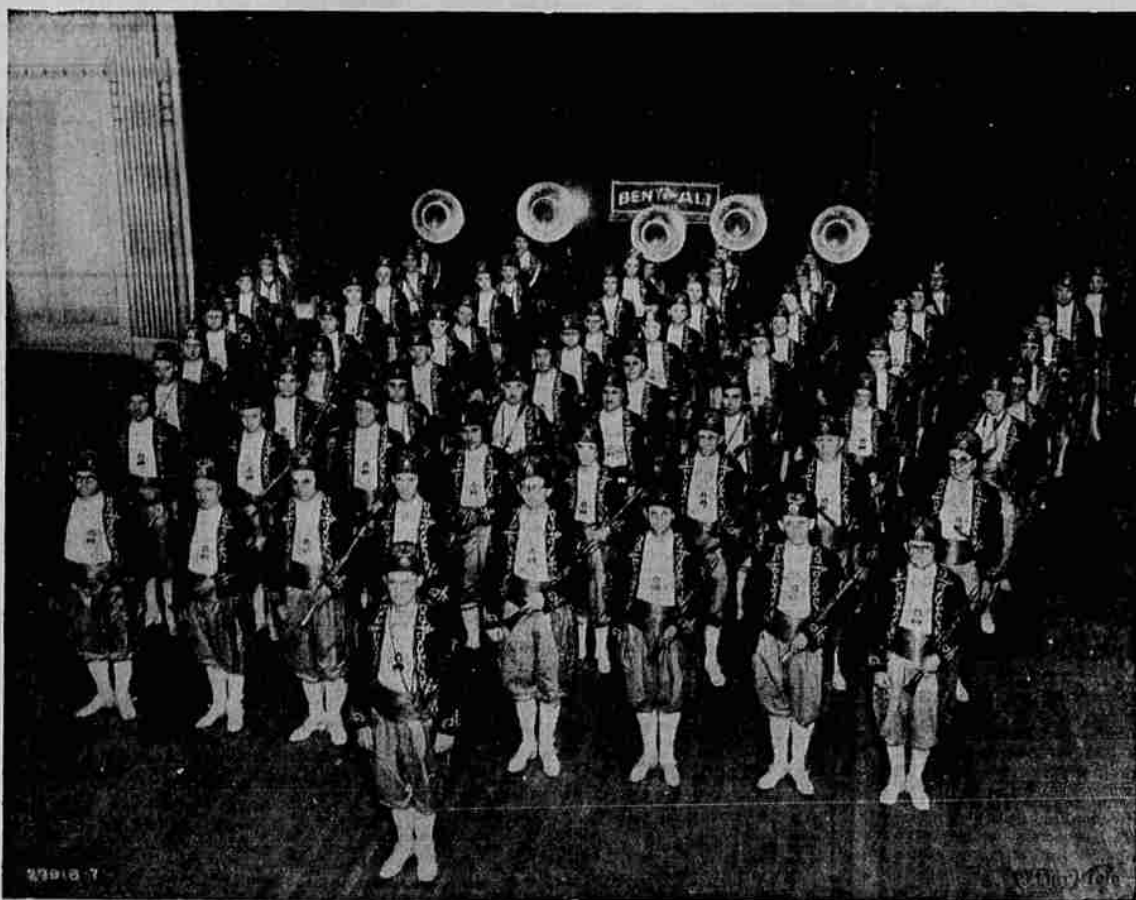

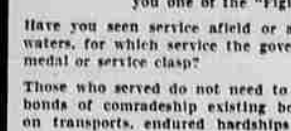

You Are Eligible—If you served in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps of the United States on foreign soil or in hostile waters in any war, insurrection or expedition, for which the government issues a campaign badge or service clasp. The Veterans of Foreign Wars extends to you the hand of comradeship.

All comrades joining at this time will have the honor of receiving the obligation by Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U. S., James E. Van Zandt who will arrive by plane from Washington, D. C., Monday, June 3rd to attend the 14th annual state encampment. Mail your application at once to I. D. SOLEMN TRIBUTE PAID WAR DEAD IN CITY'S RITES

a member of the Grand Army of the Republic. The Elks band marched immediately behind the Civil war veterans, and played funeral marches. On the return march to the city park the bands played fast tempo marches. The band was followed by Co. A and Headquarters Co. of the National Guard, after which cars carrying W. R. C. representatives, Daughters of Union Veterans, and Civil War veteran Judge Wm. M. Colvig, Mrs. J. C. Woods and Mrs. Fisher.

Spanish American war veterans were next in line, then a car carrying the Gold Star mothers. World war veterans were in the line of march, followed by Children of the American Revolution, and three cars of Daughters of the American Revolution. The parade was completed by the Medford high school band. Beneath the trees in the city park, in the presence of 800 people Memorial day exercises were held this morning. Tributes were paid to the soldier and sailor dead of America's wars, and the faith of the past was invoked for the future by speakers.

Four G. A. R. veterans—Judge William M. Colvig, Frank Mingus, J. C. Woods, and Polk Hull, all of this city, occupied chairs upon the stand, with representatives of the patriotic organizations of this city. Each representative placed a wreath of flowers upon vacant chairs in memory of departed heroes. Judge Colvig presided and for all his 89 years, read with oratorical force and vigor "General Order No. 11," and delivered from memory "Lincoln's Gettysburg Address."

Polk Hull acted as marshal of the day. He wore a red sash of Civil War days, and declined an auto ride in the parade. The exercises were opened by a boy and girl chorus, from the Washington school, under the direction of Miss Jane Dixon rendering patriotic songs.

Addresses of the day were given by the Rev. Joseph R. Knotts, of the First Methodist church and by Attorney Don R. Newbury. They stressed the needs of keeping aflame the American ideals and purposes of the past, and avoidance of old world entanglements that might imperil them. The threatening weather, with overcast skies, held down the attendance particularly the old folks.
