Klamath Falls will see its first Southern Oregon league inter-city game Sunday when Shaw Bertram and Ewauna, the two Klamath entries, battle on Mt. Mor field in the first meeting of the rival teams this year.

Medford and Grants Pass both drew busy days starting the league season one week previous to the Klamath teams.
However, Grants Pass will tangle with the Klamath Pelicans, managed by Red Sanders, in a non-league affair at the Josephine county fairgrounds. Medford is trying to schedule a game with an outside team, to be played at Jacksonville.

The protest, lodged by Manager Haight of the Medford Rogues over the game at Klamath Falls on May 20, when Shaw Bertram downed the Rogues, 16-7, seems destined to be disallowed. A. C. Ninninger, president of the Southern Oregon league, attempted to secure affidavits from disinterested persons witnessing the game, but, so far, has been unable to do so.

"If none can be obtained," Ninninger stated, "there is nothing I can do but let the game stand as played, but with the admonition that hereafter, teams absolutely must be more careful in their selection of umpires." Medford

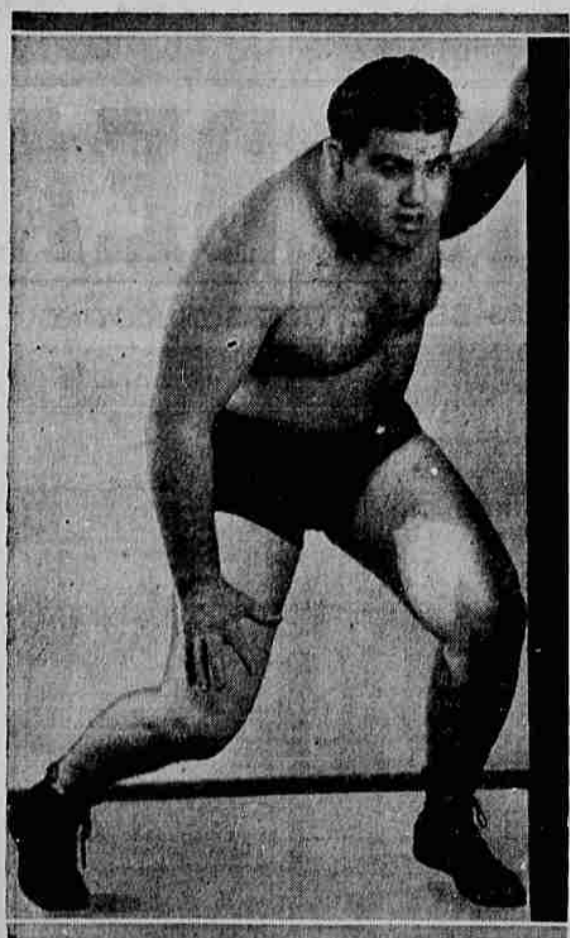

The big, bad man of the ring, Ted (King Kong) Cox, 220 pounds, Oakland, Calif., will demonstrate the latest in mean holds in Oregon's Diamond Jubilee wrestling smoker next Tuesday evening at the armory. None other than the veteran Charlie Hansen of Seattle will attempt to show King Kong that mean tricks are unavailing.

Because of the big Jubilee mat card there will be no wrestling show at the armory tonight.
King Kong's ring escapades are well known throughout the length of the Pacific coast. He has been throwing his adversaries right and left for years, and comes to Medford confident Hansen will be another to add to his list. Hansen has no worry when it concerns Cox's bull-headed intentions, assuring fans of one of the ring classics of the season.

The second stanza of the double main event planned by Mack Lillard promises more fast action in a one-hour tussle between the well known Ted Thye of Portland and Pete Belcastro, local favorite, who hails from Sacramento. Thye, whose years of wrestling have brought him naught but a steady string of victories will run up against an antagonist who tries to do his usual stuff against the handsome California Italian. The son of Italy has appeared in Medford numerous times with consistent success, and is looking forward to another victory.

Something out of the ordinary is promised for the opener. "Spec" O'Donnell of movie fame will pit his 115 pounds against Bog (Man Mountain) Burns, 270 pounds. "The bigger they are the harder they fall," is the cry of movieland's pride, who has a number of cute holds which would be the undoing of any man. Burns, well known locally, is eager for the fray but is only worried he might be able to catch up with the slippery "Spec". Burns is hoping to have Medford's smallest man, Major Arthur, 50 inches tall and 80 pounds heavy, as his second.

CIRCUIT COURT TO STAND RECESSED IN ENSUING WEEK

There will be no session of the circuit court next week, but the petit jury will be summoned for the week starting June 11, when a number of law cases are listed for trial.

The damage suit of James T. Kinkade against the sheriffs of Jackson and Klamath counties for alleged false imprisonment, is scheduled to start Tuesday, June 12. Kinkade is a resident of the Phoenix district. The sheriffs will be represented by the district attorneys of their respective counties and the plaintiff by Attorney M. O. Wilkins of this city.

The district attorney said today that the grand jury, Floyd Ross, Central Point, foreman, continued by court order from the February term, will not be called until cases pending justify the expense.

Only two cases are pending for grand jury action—May Murray and E. L. Fitch charged with criminal libel for the distribution of slanderous and malicious literature, attacking the integrity of the courts and the motives of enforcement agencies. Both waived preliminary hearings, and their cases were referred direct to the grand jury. Fitch is held in the county jail in lieu of \$1000 bail. May Murray is at liberty upon the same bond sum.

Civil cases have been docketed and will occupy the attention of the court until mid-July.

The criminal docket is the lightest since 1930 and only two minor criminal cases are awaiting trial.

EAGLES INSTALL FRIDAY EVENING

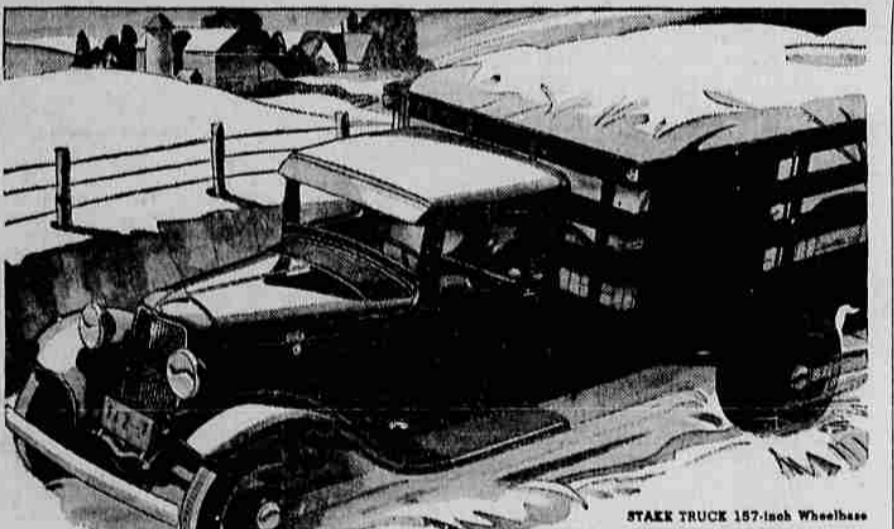
