

Jubilee Flycasting Tournament Sunday Offers Attractive Prizes

EXPERT ANGLERS TO SHOW ART IN BEAR CREEK POOL

Fly Fishermen Urged Enter Contest — Novices in Special Event—Merchandise Awards Are Listed

A list of attractive prizes will be offered for Oregon's Diamond Jubilee flycasting tournament next Sunday morning at 9 o'clock in an especially constructed pool in Bear creek just above the Main street bridge. Flycasters are coming from a widespread area to take part in this Jubilee feature.

A special event is being arranged for novices fly-casters — those who have never taken part in contests before. Fly fishermen are especially urged to take part and announce their intentions as early as possible at Jubilee headquarters. As many contestants as possible are urged to participate.

The different events include wet fly accuracy, dry-fly accuracy, distance fly and distance with 1/4-ounce plug.

The platforms and walks are now complete and casters are urged to start practicing as soon as they wish. Worthwhile prizes are in the list. The Adolf Blach Sporting Goods company of San Francisco is offering a \$40 Divine fly rod. The Baker-Hamilton company of San Francisco is donating a \$30 reel. A \$25 Wilson rod is coming from the Honeyman Hardware company of Portland and the Marshall-Wells company of Portland has donated a \$12 fine tapered line.

HOLIDAY GAMES ATTRACT FANS

The season's biggest turnout of fans made the first of the holidays which fall within the baseball season a pleasant memory to major league managers today, although it might rankle a bit in the minds of the players of five clubs which failed to win a game.

SPEEDWAY WINNER ACHIEVES DESIRE AFTER 20 YEARS

Wild Bill Cummings Leads Indianapolis Auto Race to Collect \$40,000 — Gas Limit Fails to Curb Speed

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 31.—(AP)—On the sun-scoured bricks of the Indianapolis motor speedway, Wild Bill Cummings has achieved the victory he decided on 20 years ago.

As 135,000 spectators looked on, the 28-year-old driver flashed past the finish line yesterday to win the annual 500-mile race at the record-breaking average of 104.893 miles an hour, and collect about \$40,000 in prizes and awards.

Cummings won by just 27 seconds from Mauri Rose of Dayton, Ohio, who chased him for the last 50 miles to the closest, most sensational ending in the 22 years' history of the track.

Sets Speed Mark
Cummings' time was 4:46:05.20. The Indianapolis youngster and Rose both smashed the former speed mark of 104.162 miles an hour set by Louis Meyer of South Gate, Cal., in 1933.

Thus did the daring veterans of the speedways defeat the plans of race officials who thought to place a clamp on the excessive speed by limiting gasoline allotments to 45 gallons for each little racing car. Not one of the 20 cars forced out of the running failed of too heavy fuel consumption. Cummings himself said he had "about three gallons" left over.

It was back in 1914 that "Wild Bill" playing in his mother's doorway two miles west of the speedway, told her he was "going to win that race some day." He did it in determined fashion yesterday, driving the entire 500 miles without relief, but the victory came only on his fifth attempt, and after eight years of driving on dirt tracks and other speedways.

Duray Files Protest
Stewards of the race will consider today an official protest made by Leon Duray of Los Angeles, owner of the car driven by Rose. Duray contended Cummings violated rules and gained about three-fourths of a lap during the period when the drivers were slowed down for removal of wreckage from the course.

The smashups, three in number, were all of minor characters. The most serious injury was a broken wrist sustained by George Bailey of Detroit when his car bounced over a wall at the north end of the track. The other cars wrecked were those of Chet Miller of Detroit and George (Doc) McKenzie of Edington, Pa.

DROULETTE TAKES COMMANDING LEAD IN BATTING HONORS

Al Droulette, who was playing baseball in the Pacific Coast league about the time the majority of Southern Oregon league players were first learning how to hit a teething ring with their mouth, is threatening to make a runaway of the league batting race.

The Grants Pass catcher walloped Carlstrom of Ewauna last Sunday for two hits in three trips to the plate to bring his record to 11 blows in 21 times at bat for the mark of .524.

Ogle, also of Grants Pass, is the nearest to him with an average of .416.

Lefty Wakeman, Shaw Bertram first sacker, leads his team with a mark of .383.

Hoffard heads the Medford players and Blanas, Ewauna, each hammering out basehits to the tune of .357.

Shaw Bertram leads in team batting average with a mark of .246.

Cliff McLean and Jack Hughes, Medford pitchers, are tied for the actual pitching leadership, with percentages of .567, though Earhart, Grants Pass, has won one and lost none for the nominal lead.
