

Trapshoot and Flycasting Tournament on Sunday Jubilee Program

SCATTER GUNNERS FROM WIDE AREA WILL SEEK PRIZES

Cash Awards and Trophy Emblematic of Jubilee Among Lures — Skeet Tourney Will Be Feature

The Oregon Diamond Jubilee trapshooting and skeet tournament at the Medford Gun club Sunday, June 3, will be the outstanding event of the kind in Southwestern Oregon for many years past. Trapshooters from all over the state as well as a large delegation from California have notified the Medford club that they will attend the shoot. Preceding the Oregon state shoot at Portland only four days, the Medford shoot will benefit by the attendance of many Californians en route to Portland as well as shooters desiring a workout in competition before the big Portland event.

The Medford club will have \$100 added money to the cash prizes and will give a handsome diamond set gold trophy emblematic of Oregon's Diamond Jubilee which will be celebrated in Medford, Jacksonville and Ashland June 3 to 9.

Among special events to be contested at the shoot will be the Medford Mail Tribune fifth annual tournament for the Mail Tribune trophy, the Chester Wood handicap and the Wood special prize; the Mendenhall trophy and the Diamond Jubilee grand prize and out handicap.

The Medford club has one of the finest skeet fields in the United States and special skeet events with trophies for the winners will be conducted under the management of a special skeet committee of the local club.

Special Awards Posted
Special trophies will be awarded to first, second and third high guns for C and D class shooters only on the first 80 targets in the 16-yard event. Award will be made under the Shogren system, assuring the lowest average shooter an equal opportunity for the prizes with the higher average shooters in the classification.

The Medford Gun club is rated as one of the most successful organizations of the kind in the west. The grounds are located at the north end of the Municipal airport and are equipped with the finest traps obtainable as well as new modern buildings. Shooting conditions such as fine sky line, and very little wind are natural advantages while concrete stands for shooters, lawns and shade trees add to the attractiveness of the grounds.

GUN CLUB SENDING SQUAD OF TWENTY TO OREGON SHOOT

Medford Gun club will send a delegation of 20 shooters to the annual state shoot at Portland June 8, 9 and 10, to participate in the full three-day program and to invite the trapshooters of Oregon and the Northwest to the state shoot at Medford in 1935.

Medford was a contender for the 1934 state shoot at the state trapshooters annual meeting at Klamath Falls last year but withdrew its bid for the 1934 shoot in favor of Portland with the assurance of a large majority of the clubs represented that they would support the Medford club for the 1935 shoot.

As one of the qualifying clubs for the Oregonian Telegraphic shoot trophy, Medford will be represented by a five-man team in the shoot-off at Portland. At the state shoot at Klamath Falls last year, the Medford team tied with the winning Portland team in this event, the award going to Portland without a shoot-off as two of the Medford shooters and one of the Portland team left for home, making a shoot-off impractical. The referee awarded Portland the event.

The Medford team will consist of S. G. Mendenhall, H. Crockett, William Bates, Sid Newton and Ray Coleman, with Dr. Low, Ed Pease and E. H. Lampert qualified as alternates.

Among other shooters going to Portland will be George Porter, C. M. Brewer, Jr., T. E. Daniels, Fred Hull, George Jantzer and C. W. Wood.

The Medford club will hold its Oregon Diamond Jubilee shoot at Medford on Sunday, June 3, and expects 100 shooters for the event.

Other well known critics shook their heads as they saw the Californian box seven rounds. Max was puffing like a porpoise by the time he was through and he was easy to hit.
