CAR THIEF SUSPECT WILL BE RETURNED

SALEM, June 1.—(AP)—Leroy Spencer, under arrest at Chehalis, Wash., and wanted in Jackson county on a charge of grand larceny, was asked to be returned to Oregon by Governor Julius L. Meier today. The requisition papers were forwarded to Governor Martin of Washington.

Spencer is alleged to have stolen a car belonging to C. H. Smith of San Francisco a week ago. The car was stored overnight in the Perry Ashcraft garage at Ashland. Spencer was a garage employee at the time. During the night, he is alleged to have switched the California license plates for Oregon plates and stolen the car. The theft was not discovered until the next morning.
