

HOGAN BROKERAGE OFFICE INSTALLED IN NEW QUARTERS

M. N. Hogan and company's investment securities and broker office is now installed in efficiently arranged and comfortable permanent quarters at 214 East Main street.

The new office has a main room measuring 75 feet from entrance to the quotation board in the rear, with width of 25 feet. On one side is a counter for transaction of customers' business, and a private office. On the opposite side Mr. Hogan has drafted a graph 5 1/2 by 16 feet on which the Dow Jones averages are charted showing the high, low and close daily on Industrials, rails, utilities and bonds over a period of two years. The chart also shows each day's volume of transactions.

All brokerage offices have Dow Jones charts. However, this is the only chart on the coast where all four groups are shown together, according to Mr. Hogan, who points out that the comparisons are an excellent guide for investors.

The M. N. Hogan company has a ticker service on direct wire, carrying the stock quotations simultaneously with San Francisco, Portland and Seattle. The ticker tape is reproduced on the quotation board by Translux and quotations are marked on the huge board as transactions in stocks are shown. The board also carries grain and commodity prices.

A direct wire gives fastest service on buy and sell orders, as placed by customers.

The customers' room is provided with comfortable chairs, where investors may take their ease in following the trend of the market, as flashed upon the quotation board.

The brokerage concern first installed ticker service August 30, 1933, and provides Medford with one of the few such facilities in a city of this size in the country.

Mr. Hogan extends an invitation to the public to inspect the new quarters and the staff is glad to explain the workings of the mechanisms which keep the office in constant touch with the principal markets of the country.

LEGION CARAVAN CARRIES JUBILEE WORD TO K. FALLS

The American Legion caravan to Klamath Falls in behalf of the Diamond Jubilee proved decidedly worth while, according to reports received from those who made the trip Tuesday. The Medford Jubilee boosters were given a cordial reception by the Klamath Falls Legionnaires and other local citizens and much interest was shown in the big state celebration which opens here next week.

A parade was formed, headed by city police on motorcycles, state police in cars, and the Medford drum corps followed by nearly a score of Medford cars bearing advertising banners and placards. Loud speaker equipment broadcast music and announcements concerning the Jubilee week program and a big callopo brought up the rear. Needless to say, everyone in the Klamath business district knew that the Medford caravan was in town and what for. The parade wound up at the Legion Memorial building where an informal reception was held by the Klamath Legion and "40 et 8" members for the Medford group.

Later in the evening Medford was given time on the popular "Pelican" hour over station KPJI to put on several musical numbers and a talk on the Diamond Jubilee by H. L. Bromley, chairman of the caravan committee. All indications point to a splendid attendance from Klamath Falls, according to those who made the trip.
