The next regular meeting of the camp has been postponed, it was announced at the gathering.

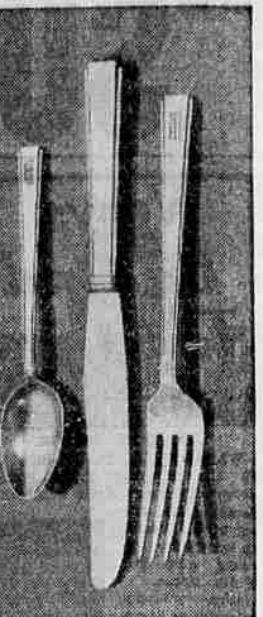
Party Friday After Graduation
