GUN, GOLF, TENNIS AND ROD EVENTS ON SPORTS MENU

Double Header Baseball Game Listed For J'ville—Jubilee Athletic Meets Get Underway.

A widely diversified sports program will be on tap today in connection with the Diamond Jubilee program. Committees have been working for months lining up the various tournaments and as a result a large number of out-of-town enthusiasts are on hand to participate.

Starting at eight o'clock, drawings will be made at the Junior high school for the first round of the Jubilee tennis tournament. Play will be started at nine o'clock. Semi-finals in both singles and doubles will be played Wednesday, June 6, and finals are slated for Thursday, June 7. Beautiful trophies are posted for the winners.

At nine o'clock this morning the flycasting tournament will get underway at the Bear creek bridge. Prizes will go to anglers who show most proficiency in wet fly accuracy, dry fly accuracy, distance unknown, distance fly, accuracy with 4-ounce lure.

The beautiful Rogue Valley golf course will be the setting for a three-day tournament—today, Monday and Tuesday—starting at 9 a. m. and 2 p. m. each of the three days. All visiting golfers are invited to compete and valuable prizes will be awarded each day for low net, low gross and other best performances. A grand Jubilee prize will be awarded the winners of the three-day play.

A trap-shooting tournament which has attracted coast-wide attention will start at the Medford Gun club grounds at the airport at ten o'clock this morning. A number of events are scheduled with cash prizes and trophies included, including the fifth annual shoot for the Medford Mail Tribune trophy.

A double-header baseball game will be played at Jacksonville this afternoon with the Medford Rogues meeting the Butte Falls nine in the opening set-to starting at one o'clock and the Jacksonville Miners engaging the Gilmore Lions at three o'clock. One admission price will cover both games.

Clay Carr, world's champion cowboy, is also due to arrive tomorrow. Carr won the championship last year and hopes to make enough points at the Jubilee roundup to maintain his high record.

COUGARS CAPTURE NORTHWEST TRACK MEET BY 2 POINTS

Discus Throw Gives Narrow Margin Over Oregon Squad—Old Records Toppled.

EUGENE, Ore., June 2.—(AP)—Washington State college won its second consecutive northern division coast conference track meet here but was pressed closely by University of Oregon and University of Washington.

Washington State scored 46 5-12 points, Oregon 42 7-12 and Washington an even 40. Oregon State made a good showing with 32½ points, Montana scored 9 5-6 and Idaho 5½.

It was George Theodoratus, giant football star of Washington State college, who set a new record in the shotput and then came through with another first place in the discus throw for the clinching points.

He bettered the old record almost a foot and a half when he put the shot 52 feet ¾ inch. The old mark of 49 feet 7¼ inches was set last year by his team mate Dunker who was second in the shotput and fourth in the discus today.

University of Oregon showed amazing first place strength, winning six events and claiming two new records with brilliant performances.

Bobby Parke bettered the javelin record almost 15 feet when he sent a shining spear whistling through the air 220 feet 7¼ inches. The old mark of 205 feet 9 inches was set only last year by Demaris of Oregon.

A new record was set in the first event of the meet when Shoemaker won the 100 yard dash, fairly flying at the finish. He clipped one-tenth of a second off the old record of 9.7 set by Fred of Montana in 1926.

Roy Peden won the 220 yard dash in 21.6 to equal the record set by Peter of Washington State college in 1928.

GUARD QUINTETS FROM EXCITEMENT, FATHER ANXIOUS

NEW YORK, June 2.—(AP)—Anemio Santiago, a widower, died today in the strangest way, officials said, ever to come to the attention of the medical examiner's office.

Wearily after a day's work, he fell asleep on his bed while darning his clothes. The needle he had been using, falling from his grasp, became wedged upright in the mattress.

When Santiago turned in his sleep the needle was driven into his heart.

CAVALCADE CLIPS OLD MARK TO WIN AMERICAN DERBY

CHICAGO, June 2.—(AP)—Charging through the stretch like a hurricane, Mrs. Isobel Dodge Sloane's Cavalcade today galloped to impressive victory in the \$25,000 added American derby to thrill 30,000 spectators with his dramatic finish.

The Kentucky winner by his victory equalled the achievement of Spokane in the same year-shattering tradition that spanned 45 years. Spokane won both races back in 1889.

Cavalcade, America's outstanding three-year-old, with 34-year-old Mack Garner on his back, smothered the field of nine with the ground-eating charge in the last quarter mile to overcome Discovery and Singing Wood, which finished second and third, respectively.

Cavalcade bounded to victory by a margin of two lengths over Discovery, the entry of Alfred G. Vanderbilt of New York, while Singing Wood, winner of the Withers mile at Belmont, was six lengths back of Discovery.

Then came Plight, winner of the Texas derby, with Patch Pocket fifth, Ben Falt sixth and Mati Hari, the same little filly which set the blistering pace for nearly a mile, pulling up seventh. Anarchy, coupled with Cavalcade, was eighth, and Technocracy last.

Cavalcade ran the mile and a quarter in 2:04, which clipped a fifth of a second off the derby record, hung up by Mr. Khayyam in 1933.
