

Medford V.F.W. Post and Auxiliary Host for State Encampment

BANQUET AND BALL WILL BE FEATURE TODAY'S PROGRAM

Session Ends Wednesday Afternoon With Election Of Officers—Parade At 7:30 Tuesday Evening.

The fourteenth annual state encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, with delegates in attendance from upstate posts, held their opening session this morning at the armory.

Naming of state committees, transaction of routine preliminary business and a short talk by National Commander James E. Van Zandt of Altoona, Pa., were the high points of the opening session.

Delegates are present from Eugene, Portland, Roseburg, Oregon City, La Grande, The Dalles, Astoria, Salem and Albany posts. Members of the Yreka, Calif., and Crescent City, Cal., posts were also present.

Delegates began to arrive late yesterday and all are expected to be registered by tonight.

Wednesday is the final day of the convention, with election of state officers for the year as the main item. A number of hot contests loom.

A banquet and military ball, scheduled for this evening, are the social features of the first day.

Members of ever post and auxiliary in the state are gathering in Medford for the 14th annual state encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.

The encampment, held in conjunction with the Diamond Jubilee, promises to be one of the most successful ever held by the department of Oregon.

Medford, with its wonderful scenic and recreational facilities, combined with the hospitality of its inhabitants is an ideal convention city, and every member may rest assured that he will have a good time.

The encampment brings to a close a very successful year, as eight new posts and 698 new members have been added in the state since the last encampment.

Local Post Active
The local post and auxiliary have enjoyed a very encouraging and successful year also, as many new members have been added and various activities undertaken, among them the annual kiddie's community Christmas tree. This is held at the armory with all children of the community under 12 years of age invited.

Last year a program of Christmas carols and music was given and 800 boxes of candy, nuts and oranges were presented to the children.

As the members of Crater Lake post and auxiliary are drawn from all parts of Jackson county, the field of activity is very large.

Aids in Relief
Crater Lake post is custodian of the county relief fund for indigent soldiers, sailors and marines and in co-operation with the federal and state departments of the Red Cross sees that no worthy veteran or his family is in want. Under able management of Service Officer Thomas K. Flynn in co-operation with the federal and county relief agencies, 173 veterans have received employment during the past year. On all highway construction work in the county, veteran preference has always been insisted on.

At the thirteenth annual state encampment at Roseburg last July, Crater Lake post introduced and had passed a resolution requiring all state and county employees be placed under civil service. This resolution will be brought before the next session of legislature for action.

Annual sale of Buddy Popples, just concluded, places in the relief fund money badly needed to carry on relief activities. Memorial Day, markers were placed on the grave of five comrades of Crater Lake post who passed away during the last year.

For Preparedness
The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States believe in preparedness and ample protection of the Pacific coast and Crater Lake post recently passed a resolution favoring establishment of a naval base at Tongue Point at the mouth of the Columbia river, and also deepening of the harbor at Crescent City.

In addition to relief and social service work during the past year, members of Crater Lake post and auxiliary have enjoyed many social gatherings, not only in their club rooms but in the home of different members and in joint picnics.

Members of the local post and auxiliary are happy to welcome the state officers and other prominent guests, who include Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U. S. James E. Van Zandt of Altoona, Pa.; Past Commander-in-Chief Harold D. DeCoe and Past National Auxiliary President Commander in Chief of Sacramento, Calif.; also Vice Commander-in-Chief C. R. Christie of Seattle.

decide," he declared. "What we shall do about exports. It is up to the American people to decide whether they want to carry out a 40 or 50 million acre crop land program or accept a worked out self-regimentation program. We engage in self-regimentation when we drive automobiles," the young leader of agriculture, adding immediately, that he was not "dead sure such a program was wanted, but we cannot tolerate the chaos of 1932."

"We can give the rest of the world purchasing power for our products by loaning the money or by changing the value of the dollar in foreign currency. That is one important short time fact for the American people to grasp today. When that situation comes to a head, as it must, it is up to the American people to decide what they want to do. We have a period of two or three years to decide what to do about exports."

Future Prices Enigma
"I cannot tell whether the value of goods at any time within the next three, four or five years will be sufficiently great to pay the interest on the debt, which foreign nations owe, and in addition pay prices for wheat, cotton, lard and fruit."

"You find in every section of the United States some tender spot in respect to the tariff; different individuals think from one commodity, Tariff, with them, is a local issue. It is in reality a national and international issue of the profoundest significance. The American people, however, are so tariff minded that these groups which have been protected by tariff are so expertly represented by talent of very high order, that there is very little prospect of substantial change in the import situation in the next few years."

The spokesman of President Roosevelt's New Deal then expressed the wish that the Democrat and Republican parties might get together with the best minds of labor, agriculture and industry, from all sections, to appoint a small committee to work out just what the American plan should be.

Regimentation, Or What?
"Self-regimentation," he added, "may be the answer. The cry of regimentation will go up to heaven, as it has gone up. If you don't want regimentation what will you do about the tariff, about surplus acreage?" the speaker asked.

"We can project a true social spirit after the style of Jeffersonian Democracy if we want to do it, by thinking hard enough and maintaining our hearts in a sufficiently sweet condition," Secretary Wallace declared, adding that such a program would constitute equally good Lincolnian Republicanism, which left the will of the majority up to the minority to confirm.

Procedure Told.
"This is the procedure we would like to carry out in the agricultural program, with respect to agreements. When two-thirds of the producers of a commodity agree, the other one-third should come along."

"Sentimental people," Secretary Wallace brought out earlier in his address, "shed tears of grief about the little pigs slaughtered in September, believing they should live to a ripe old age and be given a dignified burial. You will always find people who will say that nothing should be done until the last hungry Chinaman has been fed or naked Hindu clothed. Under the existing circumstances in the world this is impossible. I would go as far as any one in this direction, but I do not like to see a thoughtless sentimentalism used to increase the suffering of our farmer people."

The address was broadcast by the Standard Oil company announcer system, the company having sent two shifts of men here to provide this service in Medford during the Jubilee.
