When Governor Julius Meier will present an address from the steps of the old Jackson county courthouse. Historical museums will be open, as well as old-time buildings, including the Peckman bank, the oldest Methodist church west of the Rocky mountains, pioneer United States hotel and other points of historical interest.

Tomorrow afternoon will also present the second performance of Norman Cowan's roundup at the fairgrounds, with an entirely new program of events, but similar to those presented today.

The industrial exhibit in the Natatorium will be open afternoon and evening. This exhibit offers one of the most complete displays of Oregon products ever shown in this section of the state.
