

CONTINUED RAINS AND CLOUDINESS ON MAY RECORD

Monthly meteorological notes for May 1934 as prepared by W. J. Hutchison, local meteorologist, show the month opened with unsettled cloudy weather accompanied by scattered light rains during the first week. Overcast skies and broken cloudiness prevailed throughout the balance with shower weather again during the closing week. Temperatures were moderate both in higher and lower extremes, although the average of daily temperatures for the month was slightly higher than normal.

Rains occurring in the fore part of May were light but were generally beneficial to crop growth. Daily showers beginning the 24th and continuing through the 30th were somewhat heavier and relieved a drying soil in the valley. Some difficulty, however, was experienced in the curing of hay through the showery period.

The seasonal rainfall deficiency which has slowly increased from month to month, at the end of May amounted to 6.88 inches, 0.22 inches having been added as the shortage for May. Precipitation for the month totaled 0.99 inches, and for the season 10.17 inches.

Thunderstorms of moderate intensity passed over the valley on the 26th, 27th, and 28th. At times the display of lightning was exceptionally brilliant and thunder almost a continuous roll. Although these thunderstorms were occasionally fairly heavy it is understood little or no damage to crops resulted. A few scattered small timber fires were started by the lightning but the forest service reports no serious results.

Due to mild weather and general cloudiness predominating the month, minimum temperatures were mostly well above freezing and orchard heating was unnecessary. Light frosts were recorded on the mornings of the 1st, 9th, and 18th. The lowest minimum temperature for the month was 36 degrees on the 1st and 9th.

GRIGSBY RECEIVES 1ST LIEUTENANCY

SALEM, June 6.—(P)—Eight promotions in the Oregon National Guard, made in preparation for the annual encampment of the more than 3,000 men and officers at Camp Clatsop beginning June 12, were announced by the headquarters here today.

Second Lieutenant James W. Grigsby was advanced to first lieutenant and placed in command of the headquarters company of the 3rd battalion. He succeeds the late Lieutenant Milo B. Baucom, who was killed while on duty as a member of the state police.

First Lieutenant Thomas A. Davis of Portland was promoted to captain of the medical corps attached to the 186th Infantry.

First Sergeant Victor J. Micelli of Roseburg was promoted to first lieutenant and assigned to Company D of the 182nd Infantry. Micelli is a world war veteran and previously was captain in this company. He resigned later but some time ago reenlisted.

SUDDEN DEATH FOLLOWS FIRST JOB IN MONTHS

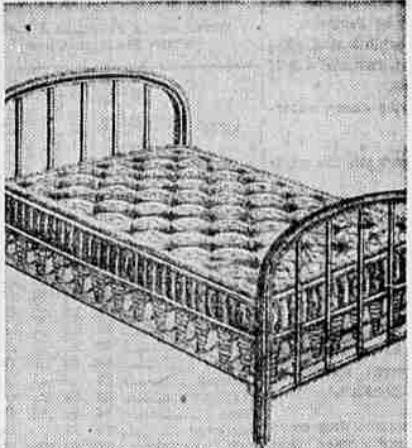
PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Twenty minutes after he had gone to work on his first job in many

Renner was hauling brick in a wheelbarrow. Apparently becoming dizzy, he plunged from the sixth floor inside the building.

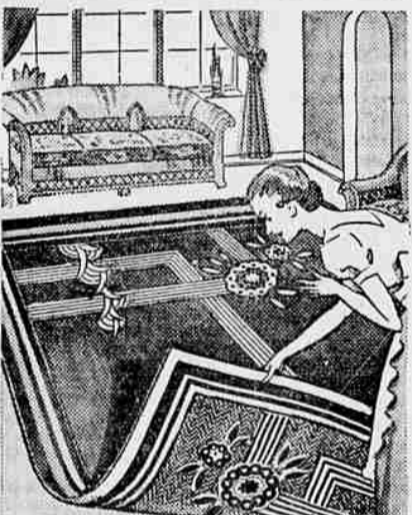
