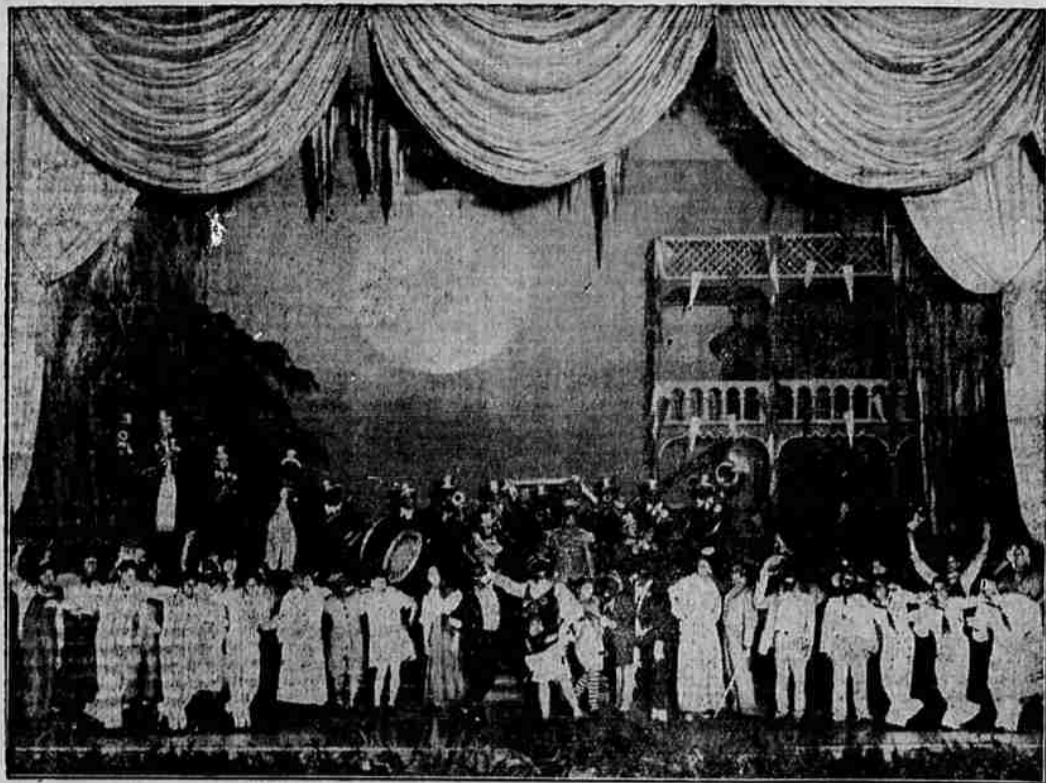


### Famous Georgia Minstrels on Craterian Stage

### AUTHOR HAYCOX IS INTERESTING ROTARY SPEAKER

"The Business Man Versus Confusion" was the title of the address delivered Tuesday at the local Rotary club meeting by Ernest Haycox of the Portland Rotary club, well known novelist. The gathering was attended by many out-of-town visitors as well as local Rotarians.

In his address, Mr. Haycox said "I am interested in one thing, and one thing only—which is the keeping open of the road of opportunity for the average American individual, so that he may earn his bread and butter, protect his home, provide for his family, lay by something against old age and achieve some degree of happiness and comfort in this all-too-short existence."

"These are about all we may expect from life. When the tumult and the shouting dies and the captains and the kings depart these things remain as the only tangible rewards of living. It is important then that the road down which such rewards lie, should open to everyone. Whether we accept or ignore the rewards is another matter entirely. But the road should be always open, so that no man may say he has been wilfully cheated or oppressed, so that no class may say that it is being crushed down to provide privilege for any other class."

"You cannot talk philosophy to a hungry man," Haycox said. "You cannot speak of ideals to a fellow out of a job or to a storekeeper with a padlock on his door or to a woman who sees her children eating the last of yesterday's scraps. These people want action. And it is precisely because there have been so many millions of people in this category the last few years that we have seen two striking and extreme types of government rise to challenge the democratic type. I refer, of course, to communism and to fascism."

Speaking of changes in government, Mr. Haycox told the Rotarians: "We can well afford any sort of reform

which aims at the suppression of abuse, which attempts to keep the road of opportunity clear for all men alike. But whatever the reform and whatever the law, it should be in each instance fair and broad and impartial. Beyond that we ought to preserve our present system."

"We should preserve it because in all this wide world there is no other system which has in it so much tolerance and reasonableness, no other system which promises the individual so much personal security and happiness. It has made us great; it will make us greater."

"After all, the province of government is to lay down fair rules of competition under which all men may operate," Mr. Haycox stated. "It is an umpire, an arbiter, a court of last resort. When it turns from that function and sets up shop in competition with the individual citizen, when it plays favorites with one or another of its classes it turns into a bureaucracy, which is the most stupid, inefficient, unwieldy mechanism the mind of man can conceivably devise."

"It comes down to this basic proposition. If we are to be a democracy we must solve our problems as individuals. If we cannot do it as individuals then we are confessing that the logic of fascism and communism is true—that we do not possess the ability to think for ourselves or govern ourselves. We are confessing that democracy is merely a dream without reality. And that is something I cannot believe and will not believe. Nor do I think you believe it."

Music for the meeting was furnished by the Hilo Serenaders, and the Girls' Octette from the senior high school sang.

### CAMP-O-RAL OF BOY SCOUTS TO OPEN ON FRIDAY

Boy Scouts of the Crater Lake Area council will hold their annual Camp-O-Ral Friday and Saturday as part of the Diamond Jubilee celebration. They will set up their camp at the fairgrounds Friday at 1:30 p. m., camping overnight and all day Saturday. Troops from the entire council will participate, coming from Siskiyou county, California, Grants Pass, Eagle Point, Gold Hill, Jacksonville and Medford. Each troop will camp as an individual unit, arranging its own camp and cooking all meals for the scouts of the troop. All events are competitive, the troops even being judged on their camp arrangement and efficiency and the meals prepared.

An active and interesting program in scoutcraft and demonstrations has been arranged for the two-day Camp-O-Ral. Committees of judges will score each event and a first place ribbon will be awarded in every contest. The large Camp-O-Ral cup will be awarded to the troop having the highest score at the close.

The committee of judges for the special camp events is R. W. McConnell, chairman, Col. W. H. Paine and Harold Woods. They will judge the troop camp making, cooking, tower building and camp fires and camp fire conveniences. The general committee, consisting of Max Peirce, chairman, F. L. Heath and Dr. F. G. Bunch will judge the following events taking place Friday afternoon: Troop yell, scouting games, fire building and water boiling, pup tent pitching, general service and semaphore signaling and fire by friction. Seth Bullis is chairman of a first aid committee that will judge the first aid contest Friday afternoon.

A camp fire will be held Friday evening at 8 o'clock. All troops will gather around the camp fire and each one has prepared a short skit or stunt, for which points will be scored. Individual Scouts will have stories and songs and there will be general singing of scout and camp fire songs.

Saturday morning the major event in the troop inspection at 9 o'clock. Captain B. B. McMahon is the chairman of the committee on inspection, and is selecting other members to aid him. The troops will be judged on appearance and the formation for inspection.

The scouts will be dismissed Saturday afternoon to enjoy the activities of the Diamond Jubilee. They will report back to camp at 8:45 and after dinner the prizes will be awarded to the Camp-O-Ral winners.

The Camp-O-Ral is the largest ever planned in this council and reports, so far, indicate that many scouts are turning out for the event. Splendid co-operation and much hard work have been given by the scoutmasters and committees. The public is cordially invited to attend and witness the events of the Camp-O-Ral. There is no admission charge.

GRANTS PASS, June 7.—(Sp.)—Skidding on Shattuck corner of the Redwood highway about four miles from Grants Pass, a car containing four persons overturned early Wednesday morning, landing with its wheels in the air.

Mrs. Arthur Hanseth of Crescent City was most seriously injured, but an X-ray examination revealed that no neck bones were broken, as was feared. The driver of the car, Mrs. Oscar Miller of Gold Beach, suffered a deep cut from broken glass on her right hand, and shock and bruises. The two men, Hanseth and Miller, were also slightly injured by the shock and impact.

The party was on their way to Medford to attend the Diamond Jubilee when the accident, caused by wet pavement, occurred, but for the sake of Mrs. Hanseth, they returned to their homes on the coast when she was released from a local doctor's office.
