

LAD EXONERATED IN SHOOTING OF INTOXICATED DAD

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 8.—(AP)—Orlando Harris, 11, was exonerated late yesterday for the fatal shooting of his father, Will C. Harris, 57, who, according to testimony before the coroner's jury, was intoxicated and abusing his wife and another son.

According to the story, the elder Harris came home intoxicated yesterday afternoon and became violent when Mrs. Harris offered him a piece of pie. He produced a double-barreled shotgun and was said to have attempted to shoot his wife. Orlando grabbed the gun while his older brother, Ivan, struck the father's hand with a piece of wood. The father knocked Ivan down and then knocked Mrs. Harris down when she tried to stop him from choking Ivan. The struggle was ended by a gunshot which entered the back of Harris' head. Orlando testified he had no intention of pulling the trigger and was not immediately aware of what had happened.

UMPQUA MINING PLANT BURNED

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 8.—(AP)—Word reached here today of the destruction by fire Tuesday night of the Umpqua Mining company plant in the southeastern part of Douglas county. The loss is reported to be in excess of \$40,000.

The company, owned largely by Portland men, has spent a large sum during the past year and a half constructing buildings and installing equipment for use in the mining of quicksilver. All materials had to be taken to the mine by pack train, resulting in much labor and expense.

The work of development was completed only a few weeks ago and actual mining started.

The fire, it is reported, destroyed all of the buildings and wrecked Diesel motors and other valuable equipment.

CHRISTIAN SCIENTISTS SELECT NEW OFFICERS AT ANNUAL MEETING

BOSTON, Mass., June 7.—Virtual completion of the new Christian Science Publishing House in Boston, Massachusetts, and gratitude to the Field for its loyal support which made this achievement possible, was the keynote at the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, held here this week.

Better and quicker healing, and closer unity in its demonstration, as well as greater consecration to the ideals set up by Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, were impressed upon the "army of Christian Science workers," more than 600 strong, who attended this annual meeting. These workers are representatives of a field which extends to such remote points as Australia, South Africa, the Philippines, as well as England and many of the continental countries. Practically every state in the Union and many parts of Canada also are represented.

The new President of The Mother Church, Dr. John M. Brewer, is a native of Antioch, California. He graduated from the University of California at Berkeley in 1902. In 1916 he received the Ph. Two years were spent as head of the Department of Education at the Los Angeles State Normal school, after which he was appointed to the position he now holds, Associate Professor of Education, Graduate School of Education, Harvard University. ORANGE NUT BREAD For Party Food

3 cups flour 1 tablespoon graded orange rind
4 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 cup orange marmalade
1/4 cup sugar 1 cup milk
1/2 cup nuts 1 egg

Sift flour with baking powder, sugar and salt. Add nut meats and orange rind. Combine marmalade with milk, add egg, well beaten, and stir all into dry ingredients. Beat well. Turn into greased loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven, 375 degrees, for one hour. Makes one good sized loaf.
