

Final Performance of Jubilee Roundup Is Saturday Night

BEST OF RIDERS VIE FOR GRAND PRIZE IN CLIMAX

Jack Tolbart Hurt in Bareback Riding Contest—Capacity Crowds Turn Out As Sun Warms Up

Thrills, spills and the largest crowd in the history of the Jackson county fairgrounds featured yesterday afternoon's performance of Norman Cowan's roundup. Over 4500 spectators from all parts of Oregon witnessed the program events, which again were outstanding in their respective divisions.

Another capacity crowd greeted the roundup this afternoon when an entirely new group of riders and horses performed. The concluding performance is scheduled for tomorrow afternoon and evening, closing the highly successful Diamond Jubilee celebration. The 12 best riders in each division of the roundup will vie for grand prize money at 10 o'clock tonight, for which special program events are being planned.

Jack Tolbart, Home Valley, Wash., was the only casualty of yesterday's activities. Entered in the bareback riding contest, he was thrown off and kicked in the region of the stomach and chest. Pains were first held that he was seriously injured, but reports from the hospital this forenoon indicated he was in fairly good condition.

Yesterday's program also presented Buff Jones, Hollywood, Calif., Pacific coast champion trick and fancy roper, and Buff Brady, Seattle, northwest champion in an exhibition which drew applause from the thousands which entirely packed the grandstand and bleachers. Hundreds stood along the fence and others sought places on the pageant setting.

More thrills were offered in the trick and fancy riding exhibition, featuring Buff Brady, Donna Cowan, Cheyenne, Wyo.; Buff Jones, Polly Dryer, Livingston, Calif., and Pete Genant, Napa, Calif. The latter is also a prize roundup clown. He has been putting on some high class entertainment at all performances.

"Bobby," the \$10,000 champion high jumping, longhorn steer, did his stuff yesterday afternoon with his owner, Monte Reger, Buffalo, Okla. The steer made a perfect jump over a parked automobile with surprising ease, despite its weight of 1210 pounds. The steer performed again this afternoon and will repeat tomorrow afternoon and evening.

America's youngest cowboy, Buddy Reger, eight years old, attempted some calf riding yesterday, but the calf was so full of energy, the youngster was sprayed in the arena sawdust in a few seconds. However, he has the makings of a great cowboy when a few more years are added.

All events were well announced yesterday, with results given in fast order. A public address system, donated through the courtesy of the Standard Oil company, with George Austin in charge of equipment, has been used since the roundup opened. ROGUES SWAMP MINERS, 14 TO 1 IN JUBILEE TILT

The Medford Rogues handed the Jacksonville Miners their worst defeat of the season yesterday when they swamped Leonard Hall's hopes, 14 to 1, on the Jacksonville diamond.

The game was featured by Jack Hughes' brilliant pitching and the heavy hitting of McLean, Hoffer and Haight of the winners. Not a hit or run was made off Hughes' delivery until the ninth inning when Manager Hall of the Miners crashed out a Texas leaguer over second base, spoiling Jack's chances for a perfect game. Hammerly followed Hall with another single, followed by White's two-base hit, which scored Hall from second for the Miners' only score.

Hooster Hoffer, with four hits in four times at the plate was the leading hitter of the day. Hoffer crashed out a home run, a triple and two singles. Cliff McLean laced out a home run, triple and single in five times at the plate, while Hal Haight connected with two three baggers and a single in four trips to the rubber.

Manager Hall fell victim to the hidden ball trick in the sixth inning, after he had reached second on Hoffer's error, the only error charged against the Rogues for the day. Hall, beaming from ear to ear at having reached second, merrily sauntered off the base, only to be tagged out by Haight. Hall is still wondering where the ball came from.

The game with the Warm Springs Indians has been cancelled according to Manager Haight. Inability to draw large enough crowds at the Jacksonville ball park was given as the reason.

Sunday the Rogues journey to Grants Pass to tangle with Ken Williams' Cavemen in the crucial game of the season. Both teams are tied for the top in the Southern Oregon league and the winner will take undisputed leadership.

NEW YORK, June 8.—(AP)—Max Baer and Primo Carners today were reported in "satisfactory" condition for their 15-round heavyweight championship fight Thursday night in Madison Square Garden bowl and the New York state athletic commission ordered the fight to go on as scheduled.

The announcement was made by Chairman John J. Phelan after both boxers had been given an exhaustive examination at commission headquarters by three commission doctors—Dr. William Walker, Dr. Morris Baer and Dr. Vincent Nardillo.

No vote in the commission was necessary as the decision of the physicians as to a fighter's condition is mandatory under the laws of the state.

S. open championship.
