The child was born at 11:15 last night to Queen Astrid and King Leopold III in the royal castle at Laeken. Her majesty and the infant son were reported to be well.

All Brussels was awakened at 6 a. m. today by the boom of 101 guns announcing the joyful event and the news was communicated officially by Burgomaster Max.

Governor C. Ben Ross said expenditure of at least \$1,000,000 and cooperation of every affected interest will be necessary to cope with the drought situation in Idaho.

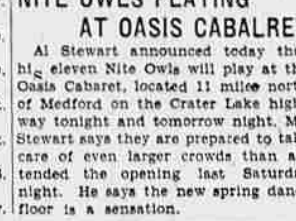
