

PRIMO AND BAER CALLED FOR NEW PHYSICAL EXAM

Promoters Getting Hysterical in Efforts to Offset Reports Men in No Condition to Fight Thursday

NEW YORK, June 12.—(AP)—Max Baer and Primo Carnera today were given their second physical examination in four days by physicians of the New York state athletic commission and reported in "fit physical condition" for the 15-round heavyweight championship fight in Madison Square Garden bowl Thursday night.

NEW YORK, June 12.—(AP) Principals in the maddest pre-fight developments in the annals of the ring, Primo Carnera and Max Baer found themselves summoned before the New York state athletic commission for another physical examination today.

No longer ago than last Friday they were pronounced in excellent condition and fully able to fight 15 rounds for the heavyweight championship on Thursday night but another thorough once-over by commission physicians was prescribed as a precautionary measure.

Meanwhile the promoters were virtually hysterical as they sought to offset reports that Baer was out of condition and that Carnera not only was in grave danger of going stale but also was actually ill.

Jimmy Johnson and his Madison Square Garden associates heaved a sigh of relief as Baer wound up training with another clownish exhibition at Astor Park yesterday, but found something else to worry about in developments at Pompton Lakes, where huge Primo spent the day in bed.

Mystery so thick you could cut it with a knife cloaked the champion's whereabouts, his condition, his health and everything concerning him for a good part of the day. Finally it became known that he had spent the entire morning, afternoon and evening in bed. His manager, Louis Sorel, said Primo was so close to the edge he was in danger of falling over and was suffering from a slight cold and sinus trouble. The champion, Sorel explained, was a mere shadow at 257 pounds and a day in bed had been recommended to bring him up to his normal fighting poundage of around 260.

"This postponement talk," said Col. John B. Kirkpatrick, president of the Garden, "already has cost us about \$100,000, or 20 per cent of the \$500,000 the match should have drawn."

JEFFRIES FAVORS CARNERA TO WIN

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—(AP)—Jim Jeffries, former heavyweight champion of the world, believes Primo Carnera will retain his title when he meets Max Baer, California challenger, in a fifteen round bout in New York Thursday night.

Jeffries, here to referee a program of amateur bouts, claims Baer is not good enough to be playboy and get away with it.

"Even if Baer is in the best condition I don't think he'll punch straight enough to hit Carnera," the former champion said. "I expect to see most of Baer's swings wash up harmlessly on the big fellow's shoulders."

"Carnera, I think, is a better boxer than Baer. My only regret is that they were not around 30 years ago."

Jeffries is now conducting an amateur boxing school in southern California.

GUARDSMEN OPEN CAMP NEAR SEA

ASTORIA, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—With troop trains arriving hourly, Camp Clatsop and Fort Stevens became bustling military centers today as the Oregon National guard of 3000 officers and men opened the annual summer encampment.

Kitchens, company headquarters and tents were set up yesterday for the guardsmen on Clatsop plains by advance details of several regiments. Picket duty commenced at dawn today when Astoria guardsmen were called out.

The first of eight special trains rumbled through this city at 9:30 a. m. Ideal weather prevailed, and light breezes wafted in from the sea. More troops will be quartered at Camp Clatsop this year than ever before, as the 21st field artillery has been transferred from Fort Stevens, where it had drilled for several years.

TRAIN WRECKERS IN NEW ATTEMPT

VIENNA, June 12.—(AP)—Train wreckers again today attempted to kill Emil Fey, minister of public security of Austria, by derailing the main line express.

It was the second attempt against the life of a high official of the government in four days. Last Saturday a bomb was discovered above the office of Prince Ernst von Serbemberg, vice-chancellor of Austria.

Frequent efforts have been made to kill Fey. Today the wreckers dynamited the Vienna-to-Budapest main line near Goetzendorf, 24 miles east of here. Both tracks were torn up, but the train, on which Fey was traveling to Budapest, was flagged in time to prevent a disaster.

ARM FRACTURED BY FALL FROM LADDER

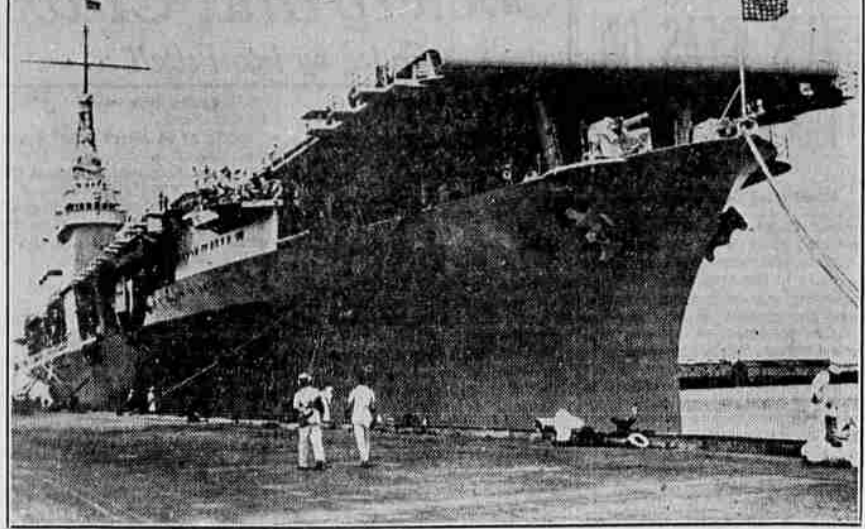
