LYNCHING FEARED IN MASS SLAYING

SUSANVILLE, Cal., June 12.—(AP)—A coroner's jury today returned a verdict of "murder by parties unknown" following an inquest into the deaths of five persons slain by an apparently crazed knife killer here Sunday night.
Meanwhile, sheriff's deputies maintained a strict guard at the Lassen county jail while rumors persisted that members of the Susanville Italian colony were considering a lynching attempt against Peter Alois, lumber mill foreman, suspected of the wholesale slayings.
Alois was arrested shortly after the mutilated bodies of Joe Fazio, a grocer, his wife and their grown daughter and son and a neighbor woman were found slashed by knife wounds.
District Attorney Grover Julian expected to file a murder complaint against Alois in a "day or two." The 45-year-old mill worker, who has steadfastly maintained his innocence, was removed this morning to a basement of the county jail as a further precaution against possible mob violence.

DENTIST MUST PAY FOR TOOTH IN LUNG

SALEM, June 12.—(AP)—The lone written opinion handed down today by the Oregon supreme court affirmed the decree of Judge Calvin L. Sweek in an appeal from Umatilla county in the suit for collection of \$1726 on a promissory note and interest from August 27, 1931, brought by Roy N. Johnson against C. C. Curl. The plaintiff won the suit and the opinion by Justice J. O. Bailey upheld him in an appeal taken by Curl.
The court, in an oral opinion, denied the petition for rehearing in the \$20,000 damage case won by Miss Mildred Schamoni against Dr. Harry Semler, Portland dentist, on charges of malpractice. The case was started upon the allegation that Miss Mildred Schamoni suffered impairment of health when the dentist, through carelessness, allowed one of the extracted teeth to go down her throat and it lodged in her lung.

BRITISH AIR FORCE TO ADD 600 PLANES

LONDON, June 12.—(AP)—The Canadian press learned today that the expansion of the British air force announced officially some time ago contemplated the addition of 30 squadrons totaling roughly 600 airplanes.
The government has let it be known that it intends to bring the air force to parity with that of any other nation "within striking distance."
Excluding 100 machines in India, Britain at present has 800 first class machines and 130 second-line aircraft.

RUM SAVES LIFE OF QUINTUPLET

NORTH BAY, Ont., June 12.—(UP)—Baby Yvonne, largest of the Dionne quintuplets, has survived the most serious setback any of the five tiny girls have experienced since their birth two weeks ago. Dr. A. R. Dafeo, attending physician, told the United Press last night.
The child would not eat yesterday and failed to respond to emergency oxygen-carbon dioxide treatment. She was sinking rapidly when Dr. Dafeo resorted to use of rum. Two drops brought her around. She was much improved today, but had lost half an ounce—weighed two pounds, eight ounces.
Marie, smallest of the quintuplets, was unchanged at one pound twelve ounces.
The quintuplets now are being fed a total of two and one-half ounces of human milk every two hours.
