RECRUITERS FINAL CALL IS FOR WARDMASTERS AND MEDIC TECHNICIAN

Sergeant Jennings D. Lowman, who is closing the U. S. army recruiting station in Medford, announced today that the army needs two wardmasters and one operating room technician for service with the medical department, United States army forces in China.

In addition to the standards required for army enlistment, the following qualifications must also be met: Men must have had previous army service, must have been last discharged with character excellent, must not be under 21 years of age nor over 35 years, must have resided in the United States at least two years since last foreign service tour, must be a natural born citizen of the United States.

The applicants who have been discharged for a period of over 90 days must furnish outline of where they have resided since discharge, together with the beginning and ending dates at each. They will also be required to furnish character reference verifications, and the applicants must be prepared to pay their own expenses to San Francisco and be prepared to act without delay.

As the local recruiting office is being closed, all information must be received from the district recruiting office of the United States army, third floor, Third and Mission streets, San Francisco.
