

BUTTER SHIPPING DEMAND STRONG

PORTLAND, June 15.—(AP)—Extreme demand for butter was showing with points in the east and California taking whatever supplies were offered out of the local territory. While 92 score continued in good call for shipping, the 91's were really in greatest demand with more of this in sight than the higher score.

There was no change in the price on butterfat for the day.

Trading in the egg market continued unchanged, demand being fully steady with receipts decreasing. More show held storage stuff was coming out but some was going into store.

Trade in the live chicken market continued dull. The big killers were still loaded with supplies which they are dressing and moving into store with as much speed as possible.

Trade in country killed meats was generally considered good.

RODEO PROMOTER HAS TROUBLE WITH BRITISH

LONDON, June 15.—(AP)—Trying to run even a "refined rodeo" in England is beset with one trial and tribulation after another, Tex Austin, American sports promoter, said today.

Austin, backing the appearance in London of a group of cowboys in a rodeo, was summoned to appear in West London police court June 15 to answer a complaint lodged by the Royal Society for the prevention of cruelty to animals that he "permitted an animal to be terrified, to wit, a steer."

"Apparently they think steers were made to be worshipped instead of used," Austin said ruefully.

"So far we have had only four accidents—all of them to cowboys. Three men have broken collarbones and another received a broken collarbone and a broken arm. England has a very active society for the prevention of cruelty to animals but none for the prevention of cruelty to cowboys."

The latest joust with persons determined to prevent the rodeo from going on arose from an accident in Monday's performance when a steer missed an exit gate, crashed into a fence and rebounded.

"That doesn't hurt a good tough steer," Austin said, "they like it." But it remains to be seen whether a London judge will agree with him.

I would say on the whole that Baer fought a perfect fight, showing rare confidence at all times and proving himself a terrific hitter. He did not waste time and energy trying to box Carnera.
