## SILVER MONEY PLANNED IN TURKEY TO SUPPLANT DIRTY, WORN CURRENCY

ISTANBUL.—(UP)—Silver money is to reappear in Turkey soon. This is welcome news to natives and foreigners alike, as the Turkish pound notes, dirty and torn, present a danger to health.

There will be coins of one, one-half and one-quarter of a Turkish pound. (A Turkish pound equals about 80 cents).

Silver money has been out of circulation since the republic, shortly after coming into power, invalidated the old Ottoman currency.

The government repeatedly had announced its intention of carrying out this monetary reform, and even a new mining law had been adopted not long ago, but, owing to shortness of silver stocks, its realization had to be postponed.

An amendment to the silver bill, which the administration has just presented in the national assembly, authorizes the finance ministry to issue silver coins of nominal value of 16,000,000 Turkish pounds. One-half is to be put into circulation immediately and the balance at a later date.

Present stocks of silver in the hands of the government amount to 33 tons. Twenty-six tons were collected by calling in the obsolete silver coins of the former regime and seven were bought in the British market.

It is expected that further purchases will precede the actual minting.

## MAN-MADE BOLTS EQUAL LIGHTNING

PITTSBURG, Pa.—(UP)—Research engineers of the Westinghouse Electric Manufacturing company have produced electrical surge currents equivalent to the most powerful discharge of lightning. It was announced here.

In their efforts to improve on present electrical equipment in regard to its ability to withstand the ravages of lightning, engineers here have built a generator which is able to produce 180,000 amperes—as much power as that generated by the most destructive bolt of lightning.

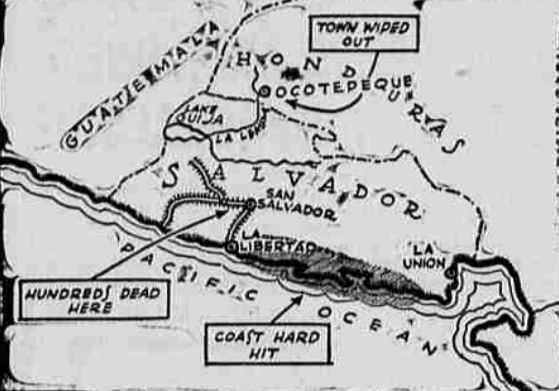
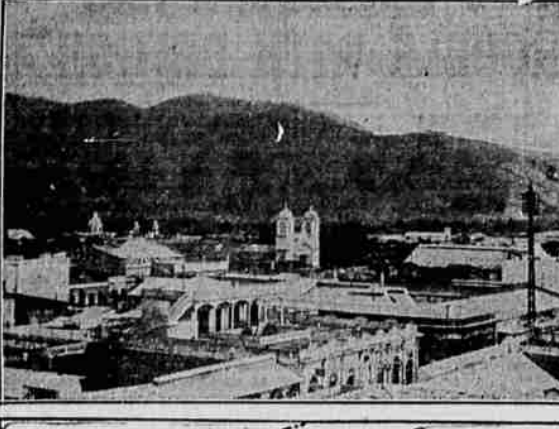
Although electrical currents up to as high as 10,000,000 volts have been produced before, this is the first time that experiments have ever been conducted in the field of extremely high currents.

The 180,000 amperes generator was designed by Engineers P. H. McAuley and W. G. Roman and installed in the company's East Pittsburg plant.
