

BOYS WARNED TO DELAY CRACKERS TO 4TH OF JULY

The sheriff's office today issued a warning to youths to cease the practice of exploding firecrackers on the highways and byways in pre-Fourth of July outbreaks of mischievous patriotism.

The sheriff's office reports that boys indulge in the following annoyances:

Throwing lighted firecrackers at pedestrians and hitch-hikers from autos, frightening the walkers, causing them to jump in front of approaching cars.

Coasting up behind autos and throwing firecrackers in such a way as to cause the driver to think a tire has blown up.

Throwing firecrackers into autos carrying women and children.

General creation of wreck messages.

Furthermore, the authorities declare the premature celebration of the nation's birthday is contrary to state law and city ordinances, as made and provided, and that if any of the culprits are caught they will be compelled to explain to the juvenile judge.

The sheriff states he is not prone to throw cold water on youthful patriotism, but feels the "hazard of wreck, fire, or injury should be checked. Numerous complaints have been filed against the practice.

The state police also have been to keep an eye out for firecracker violators.

CULINARY CRAFT....

Wedding Refreshments.

June and October are sure to bring weddings and plans for weddings. After all, the refreshments are about as interesting as the ceremony—to the guests—so, today let's plan for the bride—and her guests.

Bride's Cake.

The nicest "Bride's Cake" I know of is a fine grained "Angel" cake, baked in a loaf, then cut and decorated with a dainty white icing. The standard recipe for Angel cake will make quite a large loaf cake which will cut into about 20 squares of a suitable size.

1 1/2 cups egg whites
1 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons cold water

1 1/2 cups sugar
1 cup pastry flour
1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring

1/2 teaspoon almond flavoring

Beat the eggs so as to include air but not make too many large bubbles. When starting to froth, add the water and beat a little more, then add the salt and cream of tartar and beat until it will hold a peak. Add flavoring and blend in well. Sift the sugar and flour together several times and fold into the mixture carefully. Pour into a large loaf pan of light metal (aluminum or light tin) and bake slowly. (Cold oven for beginning, then set lower heat at 350 degrees and bake 50 minutes).

No. 2.

1 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
4 1/2 cups pastry flour
6 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups milk
8 egg whites
1 teaspoon almond
1 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream shortening and 1 1/2 cups of sugar until very light, add sifted flour and the milk alternately (1 cup of flour before any milk). Beat well. Beat egg whites until half beaten, then add one-half cup of sugar and beat until stiff. Fold this into the first mixture and add flavorings. Bake in a loaf pan at 325 degrees for 50 minutes and at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Groom's Cake.

1 cup butter
3 cups sugar
6 eggs
7 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup tart fruit jam
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon soda
2 cups sour cream
2 lbs. chopped raisins
1/4 lb. sliced citron
1/4 lb. chopped nut meats.

Cream the butter with sugar, add beaten eggs and begin adding the flour gradually, then alternately with the sour milk and soda. Add remaining ingredients and blend well. Pour into well lined loaf pan and bake at low heat for 2 1/2 hours (275 degrees).

Lemon Sherbet.

1/2 cup sugar
2 cups water
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 egg whites
4 tablespoons sugar
Few grains of salt.

Boil the sugar and water together for five minutes. Add the lemon juice and chill in freezing tray for an hour. Beat the egg whites until stiff, then beat in the 4 tablespoons of sugar. Remove the lemon ice from the tray and place in a large bowl (which has been chilled) and beat, quickly then fold in the beaten whites and salt. Return to freezing tray and complete freezing without stirring.

Vanilla Ice Cream.

4 egg yolks
2 cups milk
1 cup sugar
4 egg whites
2 teaspoons vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup whipping cream.

Cook the milk, sugar and slightly beaten yolks to a soft custard and pour into freezing tray of refrigerator. Freeze until solid. Whip the chilled whites until stiff and the cream until it just begins to "fluff" smooth. Remove custard from pan and beat and then combine with whipped

cream and fold in the beaten whites with the salt. Return to freezer and freeze quickly without further stirring. (Your favorite strawberry jam can make this a delightful sundae.)

Watermelon Salad.

Cut the rich red center fruit of the watermelon with a French vegetable cutter. Remove seeds carefully and store in refrigerator until ready to serve. Place on bed of watercress, serve with a little French dressing and garnish with sprigs of mint. (These can be made up very quickly and are especially dainty and cool.)

Frozen Chicken Salad.

1 1/2 cup cold chicken
1/4 cups crushed pineapple
6 tablespoons nut meats
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup whipping cream
1 cup mayonnaise.

Cut chicken in small cubes, drain pineapple and cut the meats not too fine. Add salt to chicken and combine with drained fruit and the nuts. Whip the cream and blend with mayonnaise, then fold both mixtures together. Place in freezing tray and freeze. Cut in squares and serve in crisp lettuce cup. Garnish with celery curls and stuffed olive.

FINAL TAX PAYING CAUSES MILD RUSH

Today, June 15, is the final date for payment of quarterly taxes under the new state tax laws and there was a semblance of a mild rush as Jackson county citizens remitted, either in person or by mail, to the tax collection department of the sheriff's office. Chief Deputy Gertrude Martin estimates that close to 500 quarterly payments will be made before the close of the day.

A number of citizens also have made full payments for the year, after starting on a quarterly or half-payment basis. This is taken as a sign of improved financial conditions. Today is also the final date for quarterly payment of federal income taxes.

OLDS ASKS DELAY 0-0 TRIAL DATE

Delay of the civil suit of the Owen-Oregon Lumber company against Millard D. Olds for money, first filed in 1926, is sought in a stipulation and order filed today in circuit court by the defendant. Olds sets forth that he is now confined at Tucson, Ariz., with arthritis and will be unable to attend on the trial dates set—July 10 and 11. An indefinite postponement is sought.

The lumber company seeks \$7,104.77, it assertedly paid on delinquent taxes to prevent a levy by Jackson county upon the Medford Logging railroad, land and equipment, necessary for the carrying on of the lumber business. The mill, railroad and timber lands were purchased from Olds and it is alleged the taxes were not paid. The Owen-Oregon company made the payment under protest.

Olds, in his answer, sets forth that money was allegedly due him, which more than offset the tax debt, and that "a mutual mistake arose over the contract" for the industrial purchase. Reform of the contract, besides the \$7,104.77 payment, is sought in the suit.

OSENBRUGGE TO SHOW OPERATIONS

SALEM, June 15.—(AP)—Two hearings have been called for June 21 at Salem, involving the operations of J. J. Osenbrugge of Medford, and F. M. Lockwood of Forest Grove to determine whether their operations under the state transportation laws are in violation of the rules of the public utilities commission.

The hearings will be conducted by Herbert Hauser, state superintendent of transportation.

The two operators were asked to bring shipping receipts, copies of contracts, daily records of vehicle movements and other data in connection with their operations.

SALVADOR LOOKS TO U. S. FOR AID

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador, June 15.—(AP)—The stricken republic of El Salvador, with 3000 persons reported dead in the provinces, looked toward the south today for assistance by the United States army.

Eleven army airplanes were reported coming from the Panama canal zone, bringing sorely needed medical supplies and emergency provisions.

Despite the terrific hurricane and rain storm of last week, which so badly wrecked the country that completely authentic reports are now being disclosed, it appears certain that no United States citizens lost their lives.

SCHERMERHORN'S ZERO HOUR NEAR

Next Tuesday is the final date for Gordon L. Schermerhorn, former sheriff, under three-year prison sentence, to file his last legal recourse, a petition for rehearing. His appeal for a new trial was recently dismissed by the state supreme court.

This move exhausted, the well-known and long-time resident has only the hope of executive clemency to save him from the penitentiary. Unless the petition for rehearing is filed, the state supreme court will issue a mandate of commitment. Schermerhorn has been at liberty on \$7500 bonds since last August. The trial judge, the district attorney, assistant attorney general, and lifelong friends have characterized Schermerhorn as "a tool and dupe of Banks and Fehl," both of whom are now in prison.

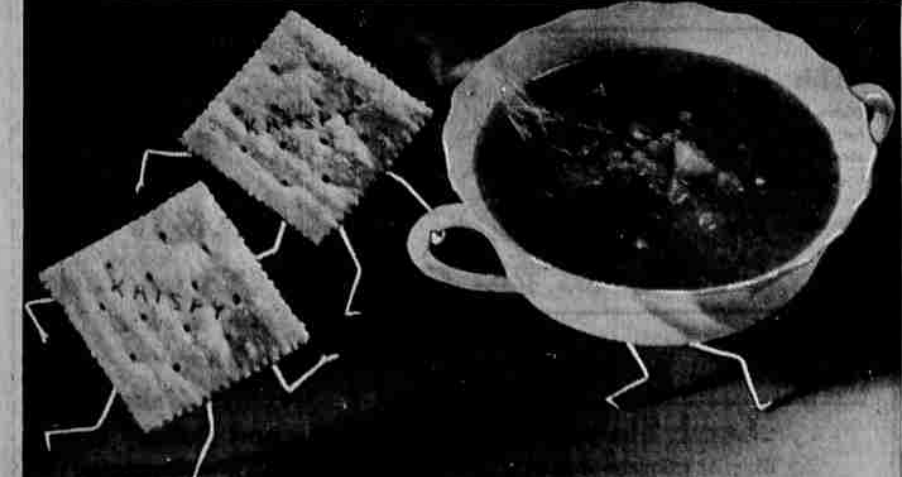
