

ROGUES DEFEATED, 10-6, AS G. PASS LENGTHENS LEAD

Cavemen Hammer Out Fifteen Hits While Locals Collect But Four—Haughtmen Lose Hope in Seventh

With Frankie Earhart and Bill Nelson pitching four-hit baseball, Ken Williams' Grants Pass Merchants defeated the Medford Rogues yesterday at the Cave City 10-6 and advanced their Southern Oregon league lead to two full games over the second place Rogues.

Led by Santee and Ogle, who each collected four hits in five trips to the plate, the rampaging Merchants hammered out a total of fifteen blows off Jack Hughes, Medford hurler and former Grants Pass pitcher.

Although outbitt by a great margin, Medford made it a real ball game until the seventh inning, being in the lead twice due to three run outbursts in the first and fifth.

Grants Pass took the lead with three runs in the sixth and led the game in the seventh with two more. Nelson took over the Merchant mound duties in the sixth and showed the Rogues the fastest breaking curve ball they have seen all year.

Al Droulette, league leading hitter was slowed to a walk by Hughes who gave him but one single in three trips, also two free tickets to first were intentionally handed him: one in the sixth with two on and the other in the eighth with second occupied.

In the sixth, with first and second occupied and Medford one run to the good, Droulette was walked to get at Bevins who also drew a walk, though not intentional, forcing in a run.

Garrett then hit safely to center and two more spiked the plate to put Grants Pass ahead for the balance of the game.

Over three hundred persons saw the game, which was ragged and slow.

GASOLINE BLAST KILLS WATCHERS OIL PLANT BLAZE

JAMESTOWN, N. Y., June 18.—(UP)—Between 12 and 20 persons were reported killed, and from 40 to 50 injured here this afternoon when three 20,000-gallon gasoline tanks exploded while a crowd of several hundred persons were watching firemen battle a blaze believed caused by an electric spark.

A reporter for the Jamestown Evening Journal estimated the death toll might reach a score. He said many were lying in the field where the crowd had gathered to watch the fire.

All ambulances in the city were called, and the Jamestown fire department called for help from nearby communities.

The tanks belonged to the Richmond Oil company. The property is located just inside the city limits on the road to Bemus Point.
