CARROTS BRING RECORD PRICES

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19.—(AP)—Carrots advanced to a new all-time high price position for this season of the year today on the East Side farmers' wholesale market. Sales were made up to 50 a dozen bunches with a general low of 40c. Demand continued far in excess of supply with resulting strength of the price position.

In fact, there was a good tone for all root vegetables with beets firmly held at 20c and turnips scarce and nominally quoted up to 50c dozen, also a high point for the period of the year.

Berry markets were a trifle erratic. Strawberries sold at a general spread of \$1.45-1.75 cate, with raspberries mostly 80c-90c and a few \$1. loganberries 50-75c. Youngberries \$1.25-1.35, blackcaps 90c-\$1. Kosmo blackberries nominally \$1 crate.
