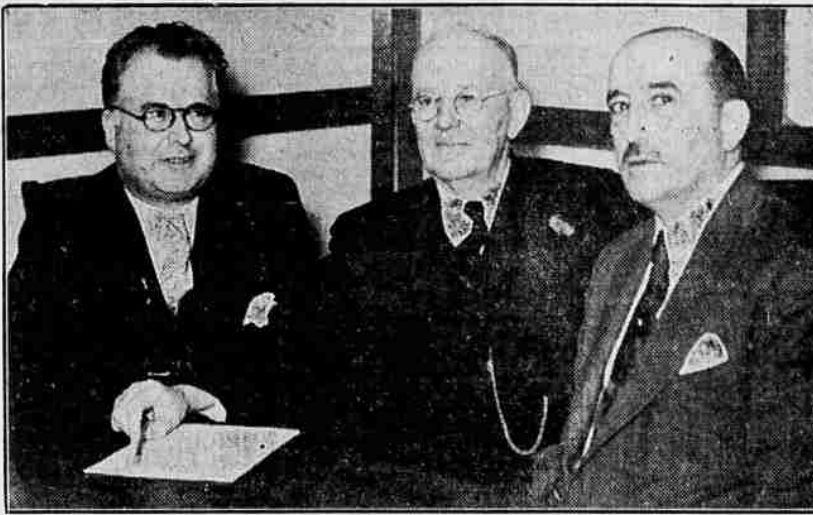

NEW LABOR ACT INVOKED TO END DOCK DEADLOCK

Sacy, Perkins Asks Workers and Steamer Company to Accept Arbitration Under Industrial Disputes Act
 SEATTLE, June 21.—(AP)—Violence broke out on the Seattle waterfront today and several persons were injured in clashes between striking longshoremen, police and civilians. Police, with swinging clubs, charged scores of longshoremen in an effort to clear the tracks for an empty freight train being shunted to pier 40, and the officers were met by a barrage of rocks hurled by strike pickets. At least one man was hurt.

EMPHASIZE JUDICIAL PHASE
