other matters in dispute and for the preservation of orderly civil, economic and social life I urge you to accept this. The resolution passed by congress in the closing days authorizes and provides for this particular type of voluntary arbitration of any point or points.

"I give you full assurance that the persons appointed to act for the department of labor will be fair, honorable and practical and that the decision will be in the public interest."
