

# Don Wagner of O. S. C. Gridiron Fame Will Grapple Here Tonight

## COLLEGIAN FACES INDIAN WRESTLER IN OPENING MATCH

### Kruse and Cantonwine Will Furnish Other Half of Double Barreled Card — Plenty of Action Looms

Two hundred and twenty-five pounds of former O. S. C. grid star, under the name of Don Wagner, will tangle with the heft of Chief "Deathlock" Little Wolf, colorful Navajo Indian grappler from Colorado, in the first half of the double main event at the armory tonight. Promoter Mack Lillard announced this morning. The hefty Wagner will replace Texas Wright, southern whirlwind, who is unable to meet Little Wolf, because of injuries received last night.

A country-famous mat artist will be seen in action at the local arena tonight, when burly Howard Cantonwine, ex-Iowa All-American football star, mixes with Broccoli Bob Kruse, Portland grip and grime man, who tested his mettle here last week when he took two straight falls from his former teacher, "Terrible" Ted Thye. Tonight's match will be a real conflict for the Broccoli boy, as burly Cantonwine is known throughout the country as an ace.

Kruse, who employs a bone-crunching bulldog tenacity in his wrestling that has gained a following, is undaunted by the grider's record, and mat fans predict will give him a thorough going over.

Don Wagner is a newcomer to the local arena, and has but recently taken up the canvas trail, but from his prowess as a football star, much can be expected in the way of dynamite when he clinches with Little Wolf for the opening engagement this evening. The Navajo "deathlock" grappler is a colorful drawing card, and employs as his favorite hold the "Indian deathlock," one of the most spectacular twists in the game. It will be his mainstay against Wagner tonight, as when it is applied, big or little, the victim is as good as down. The Indian used it to advantage last week when he won from Louie Miller in the first bout of the double bill, and has employed it in every one of his recent matches here.

The chief is a beefy bit of Indian muscle, but will be stacked up against a man mountain when he tackles the Oregon grid star.

Promoter Mack Lillard has announced a uniform price for the house, and believes that fans will be satisfied with the talent that has been secured for tonight's card in place of a preliminary bout.

## GEHRIG BECOMES HERO OF YANKEES

With Babe Ruth playing his last big league season—according to his own word—Big Lou Gehrig appears ready to become the Yankees' slugging hero instead of merely the Babe's understudy.

For the last couple of days Gehrig has been playing with a chipped bone in the big toe of his right foot but it hasn't interfered with his socking the ball or his iron man streak of over 1400 consecutive games. He closed his 18th homer of the season yesterday to bring the Yanks the first two victories over Cleveland that gave them a half-game margin over the Tigers.

With the score tied in the ninth, Lou rode the ball out of the park to gain a 3-2 Yankee victory and give Lefty Gomez his 12th mound victory. Red Ruffing followed that up with a one-hit hurling job to win the second game, 3-0.
