

SOUTHERN OREGON TRAVEL INCREASE SHOWN BY COUNT

Greatest Gain On Redwood Highway North of Caves Road Junction—Medford Area Traffic Is Growing

An increase of travel on highways in southern Oregon over last year, was evidenced in a check taken at 22 stations Friday, according to J. G. Bromley, residence maintenance engineer, the figures showing 1281 more cars checked than on June 16, 1933.

The greatest gain in travel was shown on the Redwood highway, north of the junction with the Oregon Caves highway, with an increase of 222. An increase of 180 was made at the south of the junction of the Pacific highway with the Williams secondary highway of Grants Pass, and an increase of 164 at the junction of the Oregon Caves and Redwood highways.

A decrease of 82 was recorded at the Pacific highway north of the junction with the Green Springs highway, and a decrease of 28 at the Williams secondary highway, south of the junction with the county road known as the Old Redwood highway.

The location of the stations, and the number of cars checked are shown, the first figure being the results of June 16, 1933, and the second in the check of June 15, 1934:

Pacific highway one mile south of Medford, 2576, 2680; Pacific highway north of junction with Green Springs highway, 865, 833; Pacific highway south junction Green Springs highway, 613, 604; Green Springs highway junction with Pacific highway 334.

GRANGE PLANNING BIG 4TH OF JULY IN ASHLAND PARK

ASHLAND, June 21.—(Sp.)—Oregon Grangers are planning for a Fourth of July celebration in Ashland which will draw an estimated crowd of 4000 people to the city for the day, and which will include on the program three prominent speakers, Joe E. Dunne, Charles M. Thomas, public utility commissioner, and Mrs. Juana Williams, lecturer for the California state grange. There is possibility, according to Grange leaders, that Ray Gill, state master, may appear on the program.

The celebration will begin in the morning in Lithia park with athletic contests for children and adults. There will be a picnic lunch in the park at noon, and at 1:30 the speakers will appear at the band stand in the park. There will be entertainment at the Twin Plunge, probably a bathing contest, and dancing will take place in the armory. Old time and modern dancing will begin at three in the afternoon, and run until 12 at night.

The gathering of Grangers will be one of the greatest ever held in southern Oregon. People from as far as Roseburg will attend, and many prominent Oregon citizens will be in attendance.

Senator Steiwer will leave here June 28, reaching Oregon by July 18 via the Panama canal.
