THOMAS FIRM IN REFUSAL TO RUN AS INDEPENDENT

these offices have already been nominated and they are taking the matter under consideration, political observers here declared.

Brown Congress Choice

Sam Brown, who ran second for the republican nomination for governor in the one favored to run independent for congress in the first district against James W. Mott and H. R. Turner, republican and democratic nominees, will Mahoney, unsuccessful democratic nominee for governor, was slated to run for congress from the second district against Jay Upton and Walter Pierce, the major party nominees. Frank Hilton, who ran for republican nomination for district attorney of Multnomah county, had under consideration permitting his name for the independent in the third congressional district.

Face Legal Obstacles

All three of these mentioned candidates, however, face some legal obstacles in their campaigns because they had already filed for party nominations in the primary at which time they filed statements they would not accept the nomination of any other party at the general election. Attorneys however disagree on the interpretation of the pledge and supporters of the independent movement state the legal obstacles could easily be overcome.

Just when this second meeting would be held had not yet been settled, but it was definitely determined that mention of this ticket would not come up at the assembly Monday, but that the two tickets would be sponsored separately.

Platform Cut and Dried

The convention Monday, which will be all outlined before the hour of 10:30 arrive when L. H. McBee of Dallas will call the meeting to order the temporary chairman, will leave the drafting of the platform to their nominees. The session will be about 100 per cent for Zimmerman.

If Zimmerman drafts the platform, it will contain as the three main points the state bank, state ownership of power transmission lines from Bonneville, and anti-sales tax. This he made known last week when he asked if he would consider being a candidate, and was the same principle sponsored by the state grange in resolutions adopted at the annual meeting in Roseburg. Additional planks no doubt would be listed.

Following opening of the session, the matter of naming a permanent chairman will be in order. The names of Judge L. H. McMahan of Salem and former State Senator Arthur W. Orton of Portland have been mentioned. An upstate man would be preferred, it was learned, and it was indicated McMahan was favored at the present time. Orton was a member of the state senate in 1917 and 1919.

The permanent chairman would sound the keynote address of the meeting. The nomination of Zimmerman would follow. While Zimmerman was scheduled to be absent at the morning session, the convention would then adjourn until afternoon at which time Zimmerman would give an address outlining his platform.

HOUSING PROGRAM WILL BE AIDED BY ACTION UNDER NRA

To increase activities under the housing program, which is designed to encourage building of new homes and the repairing of old:

And to carry out the announced policy of NRA to keep prices from mounting to excess.

Permit Narrower Margin

Increased volume of building activity will permit a narrower margin between production costs and selling prices.

It was predicted also that it will more than offset the increased costs of labor which, in some of the building industries, especially lumber, has risen from 80 to as high as 400 per cent.

Harry L. Hopkins, federal relief chief, is expected to take charge of the housing program unless he personally signifies a contrary preference to the president. This he may do, in view of his liking for present duties.

Plan Celebrations

Plans are being made to dramatize the program with celebrations, similar to those under which NRA was launched with huge parades throughout the country, the informant said.

The building materials industry will be among the first to "get on the band wagon," it was added, with their announcement of price slashes.

The lowered prices will have the complete sanction of the government.

CULINARY CRAFT....

REFRESHING DRINKS

Before you purchased your electric refrigerator, didn't you often think that if you did own one you would be enjoying marvelous cold drink concoctions as well as the many, many other advantages that would be yours with such ownership? Of course you did. But are you actually making use of the opportunity and having a variety of refreshing beverages? Speaking from general observation, I'm pretty sure you are not using either your imagination or refrigerator for a lot of delightful refreshments that might be yours almost for the asking. Maybe a few suggestions will start you on the trail of more combinations.

Loganberry Hi-Ball

To each glass:
1-3 glass of loganberry juice.
1 teaspoon lemon juice.
1 cube of ice (1 tablespoon crushed ice).

When ready to serve, add dry ginger ale to fill glass.

Orange Egg-Nogg

To each glass:
1 egg.
1/2 cup orange juice.
1 teaspoon lemon juice.
1 tablespoon powdered sugar.
1 ice cube.

Beat egg well, add juices and sugar and stir well. Pour over ice cube and chill.

Frosted Mint Chocolate

2 squares chocolate.
1 cup water.
1/2 cup sugar.
1 quart milk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon peppermint.
1/2 pint ice cream.

Melt chocolate and add water, boiling until thickened. Add sugar and milk and cook five minutes. Chill, add flavorings, salt and ice cream and beat with rotary beater until well blended and frothy. Pour into tall glasses and, if you wish, add a teaspoon of ice cream.

Sherry Egg-Nogg

To each glass:
1 egg.
1/2 cup chilled milk.
1 teaspoon sugar.
Pinch of salt.
1 tablespoon sherry flavoring.

Beat egg yolk until thick; add sugar, salt and flavoring. Add milk and shake well. Fold in white which has been beaten light but not stiff. Pour into tall glasses and sprinkle lightly with nutmeg.

Cider Blend

1 quart cider.
2 oranges.
1 cup water.
2 lemons.
1 bottle ginger ale.

Add fruit juices and water to cider and chill for several hours to develop flavor. When ready to serve combine with frosted ginger ale.

Frosted Coffee

To each glass:
2 tablespoons coffee syrup.
1 cup milk (chilled).
1 tablespoon ice cream (vanilla).

Place in covered container and shake thoroughly. Pour into tall glasses and add a topping of ice cream if desired.

Lemon Shake

To each glass:
1/2 lemon—juice and rind.
2 tablespoons sugar syrup.
1/2 cup water.
1/4 cup crushed ice.

LONDON, June 22.—(AP)—America's four Davis Cup players today fought it out among themselves in the semi-finals of the Queens club tennis tournament and when the smoke of play and argument had cleared away, Frank Shields and Sidney B. Wood Jr., were the surviving finalists.

Shields overpowered George M. Lott, Jr., 6-3, 6-4 and Wood won from Lester Steffen in a three set marathon 2-6, 15-15, 6-3. Dorothy Andrus, of Stamford, Conn., sole survivor in women's singles, also won her way to the final round, defeating Mrs. Molesworth 3-5, 6-4, 6-3.
