### HOPE DIES FOR CONVICTED MAN

**DENVER, Colo., June 22—(AP)**—A last-minute attempt to obtain a stay of execution for William Cody Kelley, scheduled to die at sundown in Colorado's lethal gas chamber, failed this afternoon when justices of the supreme court indicated they considered an appeal filed on behalf of the condemned man to be in irregular form.

Prison officials this afternoon thwarted what they believed was a plan by Kelley to commit suicide, thus escaping the gas tank, the thought of which terrified him until he collapsed this week.

**LOS ANGELES, June 22—(AP)**—If Robert E. Buckley wants to eat light globes, stry bits of metal and such things between meals, the other prisoners of the Los Angeles county jail will have to put up with it.

It's his stomach and his diet, although some of the metal delicacies he munches may belong to other prisoners. And the county's psychiatrists insist his unorthodox taste is no sign that he is insane. So Superior Judge Charles S. Burnell overruled the protests of Buckley's annoyed cellmates, and sent him back to jail for six months for receiving stolen property.

Buckley ate that sort of thing for so long in a circus act he thinks choice bits of metal and glass are "table delicacies."
