The state highway department today also received instructions in the expenditure of the \$3,097,814 share of the Hayden-Cartwright appropriation for highways from Washington today.

None of the money can be used for administrative purposes, the department was advised.

Further allocation of the money must be as follows: not less than 20 per cent must be expended on extensions of federal highways in and through municipalities; not less than 25 per cent on secondary feeder highways, and not more than 50 per cent on the primary highways outside of municipalities.

### John Barrymore in Comedy Role



When a hair-brained producer makes violent love to his most temperamental star, in order to get her signature to a contract, complications are almost bound to happen. And they do in "Twentieth Century" starting its local engagement at the Craterian theatre today, with John Barrymore and Carole Lombard in the leading roles.

"Twentieth Century" has Barrymore in his first really hilarious comedy role—a part that may be likened to a composite of several eccentric and well known Broadway producers, tinged and colored with Barrymore's own personality. Carole Lombard is shown as a temperamental spitfire, as eccentric and as self-centered as her employer and lover. They fight, make up, fight again, indulge in all sorts of theatrics much to the dismay and near collapse of Walter Connolly and Roscoe Karns, as the press agent and right hand man of the producer. It is fast, witty and uproarious throughout, without once having any trace of amittiness.
