Roaring yesterday, as fifteen years ago it roared for the Chicago White Sox, the big bat of Swede Risberg, one of baseball's forgotten men, led the Medford Rogues to a smashing 7-6 victory in fourteen innings over Shaw Bertram in the greatest game in the history of Klamath Falls.

From out of the past, from that dark smear on baseball's slate, the 1919 Chicago-Cincinnati world series scandal in which Risberg, along with four others, was found guilty of selling out his team to gamblers, stepped this tall, clean-looking ball player to pound out four smashing hits and give a Medford team that had lost two straight, the precious punch that it needed so much.

It was Risberg in the first inning, singling to left to start a two run Medford rally; it was Risberg in the third, smacking a two bagger to right and scoring a moment later on Hoffer's single; it was Risberg in the fifth, hitting behind Calvert on a perfect hit and run play to arrange for them both to score on Eubank's single; and finally, in the fourteenth inning, it was Swede Risberg, singling to right to set the stage for Ray Eubanks to drill out his game winning hit, scoring Hoffer, who had forced Risberg to second and gone to second on Haight's infield out.

And that was that. That was what Swede Risberg did.

Cliff McLean, until yesterday a member of the Rogues, pitched the entire game for Shaw Bertram and pitched his heart away trying to get revenge on his former teammates.

And what a grand try he made. He allowed only thirteen runs in his fourteen innings of labor and struck out eleven but, as mentioned above, it was just too much Risberg.

Starting on the Medford mound and working nine innings, was Bill Sargent, who belongs to Shreveport in the Dixie league. Sargent pitched nice ball during his stay, giving over his duties to Paul Hess in the tenth after Shaw Bertram had come from behind to score two runs in the ninth, tying the score and forcing the game into extra innings.

Hess, who is only 19 and just out of Jacksonville high, got the acid test and came through like a veteran. He struck out four and allowed three hits in his five innings and once, in the thirteenth, with the bases loaded and one out, he rose to real heights by striking out Stanliha, and making Cogan ground to Risberg.

Wakeman and Donaldson each blazed out four hits to lead the Shaw Bertram players. Included in Wakeman's bunch was a triple and home run; the lone four base clout of the game. It came with the bases empty.

The score was tied no less than four times and from the ninth inning on, both teams went runless until Medford's winning run in the final frame.

MOVIES CHANGE RESULTS IN BIG ATHLETIC MEET

LOS ANGELES, June 25.—(AP)—Advance of the machine age into intercollegiate athletics today threatened to rout judges and timers of track events from the speed courses and drive them into the stands with the cash customers.

Definite indication of this was given when officials of the N. C. A. A. meet at Memorial Coliseum Saturday boldly threw into the discard placing selections in five of the eight running events and rewrote the finish of these after minute study of motion pictures. When they got through, one of the champions enthroned was shorn of his crown, and the team points were shifted materially, although Stanford's victory was not altered. The I. C. A. A. champions ran up an amazing total of 83 points, but the change added four to Southern California's figures, leaving the Trojans 57 7-20 for second. Louisiana State lost four in the shuffle, but the defending champions from the bayous held to third with 43.

The electrical motion picture timing device, which gave the officials an accurate picture of what the eye failed to correctly detect, probably cheated Glenn Hardin, L. S. U.'s great quarter-mile and hurdler out of a world's record in the 220-yard low barriers since it clocked him in 23.16 seconds, as against the 22.7 mark the stop watches showed.

This would still leave five new N. C. A. A. records broken with three of them exceeding present recognized world's marks. Since none of them matched performances now on application, it was unlikely that requests would be made for their sanction.

Smart base running on the part of Sherry Miles' men and Miner infield errors at crucial moments lost the game for Hammerley. De Paqual, Poole and Moore led Butte Falls' hitting, with two clouts each, while Wayne Coker starred for the Miners with three hits in three times at bat. YANKEE GOLFERS FIND HARD GOING IN BRITISH OPEN

SANDWICH, Eng., June 25.—(AP)—America's "big four" in the British open golf championship, including Denny Shute of Philadelphia, the defending titleholder, found the greens fast and tricky today and as a consequence were no less than nine shots behind the front-running Henry Cotton, whose brilliant, par-cracking 68 set the pace in the first 18 holes of the 36-hole qualifying round for the championship proper which begins Wednesday over the Royal St. Georges course.

Cene Sarazen, champion in 1932 and betting odds favorite, Joe Kirkwood, trick-shot Australian, and MacDonald Smith, the veteran Scot who still is seeking his first national title, posted 75's, while Shute was still further back with a 76.

Starting off with a record field of more than 300 golfers, of which the first 100 and ties will qualify for the 72 hole championship, Sarazen and Smith played their first round over the 'Royal Cinque Ports course in Deal, while Shute and Kirkwood performed at Royal St. Georges.
