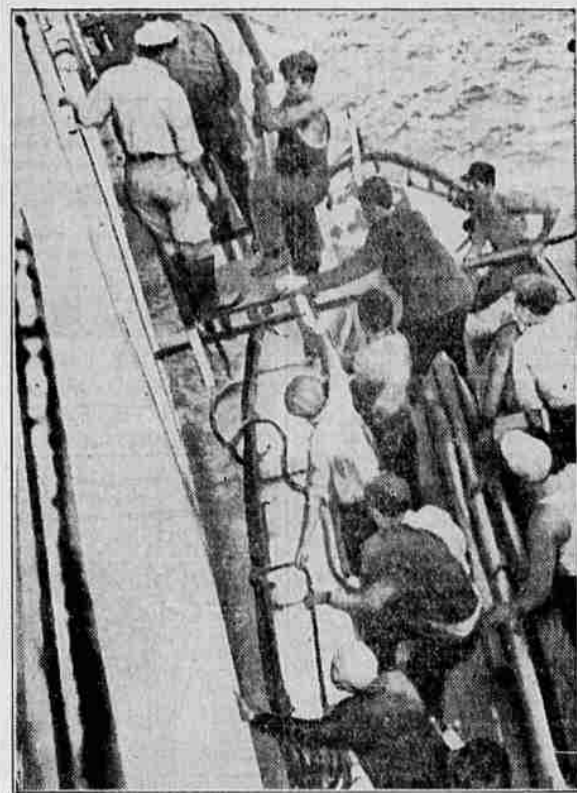
STUDIO HOLDS OVER 'CAT AND FIDDLE'

Craterian Showing Barrymore Comedy

Comedy that runs all the way from the old Keystone cop variety to ridiculous satire is presented in "Twentieth Century" at the Craterian theater until tomorrow night, with a headnote, unrivaled John Barrymore and Carole Lombard presented. Yet it is as bright as it is ludicrous. Laughter that brings tears to the eyes in the dialogue, situation and action.
 It is a burlesque of stage people; a bare-brained egotist producer, an explosive temperamental star and the stardom surrounding them. And an outstanding feature is the fact that the picture is entirely clean. There isn't a single questionable line of dialogue or bit of action.
 Cold type can hardly mirror the hilarity of the show's theme and the vivid farcical characterizations of the people who interpret it; nor can it adequately reflect the slapstick treatment that moves the work along with gaudy lighting speed. Barrymore is a composite of every genius producer and all their idiosyncrasies that ever lived. He rants and raves and waves. While making Carole Lombard a great star, he drives press agent Roscoe Karns and right hand man Walter Connolly mad and audiences into gales of glee. The girl, acquiring all her mother's madness, quits, moves to Hollywood, and becomes even more famous, while hard times, ill-luck and what-not wetblanket every Barrymore production effort.
 All the foolishness that precedes is just an appetizer for what is to follow as the manage moves aboard the 20th Century Limited and Barrymore learns his errand star is aboard. To rehabilitate his fading fortunes, he must get her name on a contract. They toss in a harmless nut, a couple of long whiskered chaps and the

 In 1923 Zimmerman was elected state senator from Yamhill county and served four years. He returned his farm until 1931 when he was again elected to the state senate for four years.
