

WM. A. MARSHALL FOUND DEAD WITH BULLET IN BRAIN

and Ray Stoneker, and State Traffic Officers Joe Polson and O. A. McKinnon.

Took Uncle's Car.

Reports at the state police office show that Marshall had taken a car belonging to his uncle, John Powell, 410 1/2 Hamilton street, who is employed in a box factory on North Central, between 9 a. m. and noon yesterday. The vehicle was abandoned at 5 p. m. 3 1/2 miles north of Eagle Point on the Crater Lake highway.

State police were notified at 8 p. m. by Otto Shank, who lives in the Eagle Point district, that the car was left on the highway and that Marshall was seen walking south toward Eagle Point carrying a rifle, probably the one he used later in committing suicide. A note was left in the machine police report, which read, "Sorry to take the car but I had to get away." The message was signed, "Bill."

Authorities have no clue as to Marshall's motive for taking the car or for the trip to Eagle Point. The last report of the boy's whereabouts before he appeared at the Main street boarding house was that he was walking toward Eagle Point along the highway.

Note Mute Crumpled.

The note, which by its crumpled and worn appearance, suggested that it had been carried for several days, and that the boy had been in a dependent state of mind for some time, read: "Goodbye. To hell with girls, to hell with everybody." Marshall was dressed in a blue shirt and a pair of blue denim overalls. Powder marks on the boy's forehead and eyes evidenced the way he had held the gun to his head.

Two .22 long cartridge were found on the stairs, apparently having fallen out of a pocket of the boy's clothing. Each bullet had been grooved with a knife to make the effect more deadly, it is thought.

Was Pin Setter.

Marshall's only employment was at a local bowling alley setting pins. A fleece-lined coat was found after the tragedy near the entrance of the Littrell Park Co. store on East Main, in which was found a pencil thought to have been used to write the farewell message. It is thought Marshall left the jacket there before going to the hallway where he committed suicide.

Marshall came to Medford last fall from Walla Walla, Wash., where he had been staying up until then with his father.

A coroner's inquest will be held tonight at 7 o'clock at the Perl Funeral parlors. Funeral services will be held tomorrow at 1:30 p. m. at the Jacksonville cemetery.

JORDAN RECEIVES SECOND SENTENCE

KLAMATH FALLS, June 26.—(AP) Theodore Jordan, condemned negro, was today quickly and quietly sentenced to die on the gallows at the Oregon state prison on Wednesday, August 1.

Jordan, brought to Klamath Falls from Salem by auto this morning, received sentence in fifteen minutes shortly before noon.

Sheriff Lloyd Low and his deputy, R. D. David, left again immediately for the north to return the murderer to the state prison.

Jordan was refused an extension of 24 hours before hearing sentence following the loss of his appeal to the supreme court.

He was convicted here December 10, 1932, for the first degree slaying of F. T. Sullivan, train steward who died on October 15, 1932. Sullivan was attacked in his berth in the railroad yards on June 3 of that year.

MODIFY DECREE IN FORECLOSURE FEHL MORTGAGE

SALEM, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—The following opinion, in a Jackson county case was handed down by the state supreme court today: Neidermeyer, Inc., vs. Pacific Record Publishing Co., defendant, and Earl H. Fehl and Electa A. Fehl, appellants, and Roy M. Parr and Ralph G. Jennings, defendants. Appeal from Jackson county. Suit involving foreclosure of chattel mortgage. Decree of Judge Earl C. Latourette modified in opinion by Justice Bailey.

The action was instituted by Neidermeyer, Inc., against Earl H. Fehl and Electa A. Fehl, for foreclosure of a chattel mortgage against the equipment of the Pacific Record-Herald. The appeal was based upon a "slight dispute" relative to the placing of certain credits, and does not affect the main issue, according to Attorney George M. Roberts.

The nature of the modification will not be known until the opinion is received from the supreme court.

Under due process of law, the machinery involved was sold last winter to Robin Reed of Heedsport, wrestler-editor, who moved the machinery to the north part of the state.

The case was heard two years or more ago, before Judge Earl A. Latourette of Oregon City. The case has been on appeal since. It was one of the numerous legal actions in which Fehl became involved.
