

GOLFING TROPHIES ON EXHIBITION IN TOGGERY WINDOW

In connection with the membership drive that is being conducted by the Rogue River Valley Golf club, an interesting group of trophies and photographs are on display in the windows of the Toggery. The group consists of cups awarded at the local course during a period of several years, and several photographs are exhibited illustrating the events and their participants.

The cup designating the 1931 spring handicap tournament championship, which was won by Henry H. Pringle is displayed, as well as the cup won by William F. Isaacs for the same event in 1930.

The trophy presented in 1933 by August P. Johnson is exhibited, among the winners of which are listed H. Chandler Egan, local golfer on this year's United States Walker cup team, which defeated Great Britain so decisively. An enlarged photo of the veteran player is also exhibited, taken by Shangle. Egan scored a low score of 87 in the 1933 local tournament, and low net score, a 63, was made by J. B. Kirk in the same event.

Also for the 1933 season, the champion dub trophy, won by Robert W. Ruhl, is exhibited. A photo accompanies this cup, and shows Ruhl as he received the trophy emblematic of his victory.

The Pacific Air Transport trophy lists the names of its winners as J. W. Townsend, 1931; A. S. V. Carpenter, 1932, and John B. Kirk, 1933.

The Wm. Fox trophy for low medalist of the year lists as its winners: 1929, F. W. Weeks; 1930, D. B. Clark; 1931, F. W. Townsend; 1932, H. B. Kellom; 1933, J. B. Kirk.

The 1931 Southern Oregon championship, second flight trophy, was won by Homer Marx. J. B. Kirk is the winner of the third consolation cup and Marx took the second consolation trophy.

The Larry Schade southern Oregon golf championship trophy lists its winners: 1929, R. B. Hammond, Jr.; 1930, Donald S. Clark; 1931, R. B. Hammond, Jr.; 1932, Leslie Leal; 1933, H. H. Pringle.

The Ashland team trophy, which is exhibited was won this year by the Medford club.

The ladies' spring handicap trophy offered by the Murray Beauty Parlor, shows as its winners, Mrs. R. B. Smith in 1933, and Mrs. J. C. Thompson in 1934.

There is also a cup designating the 1913 boys' singles tennis championship in the display, won by Henry Pringle.

The other photographs, all of which are by Shangle, include one of Jack Hueston, local pro, Bill Hookney, Klamath Falls pro, Egan and Clark. This photo was taken last year. There are also two more pictures of Hueston, and one of Bob Hammond putting on the 16th green. Three more pictures are scenes during the Oregon state finals match on the Oswego Country club course in Portland between Don Moe and Rude Wilhelm.

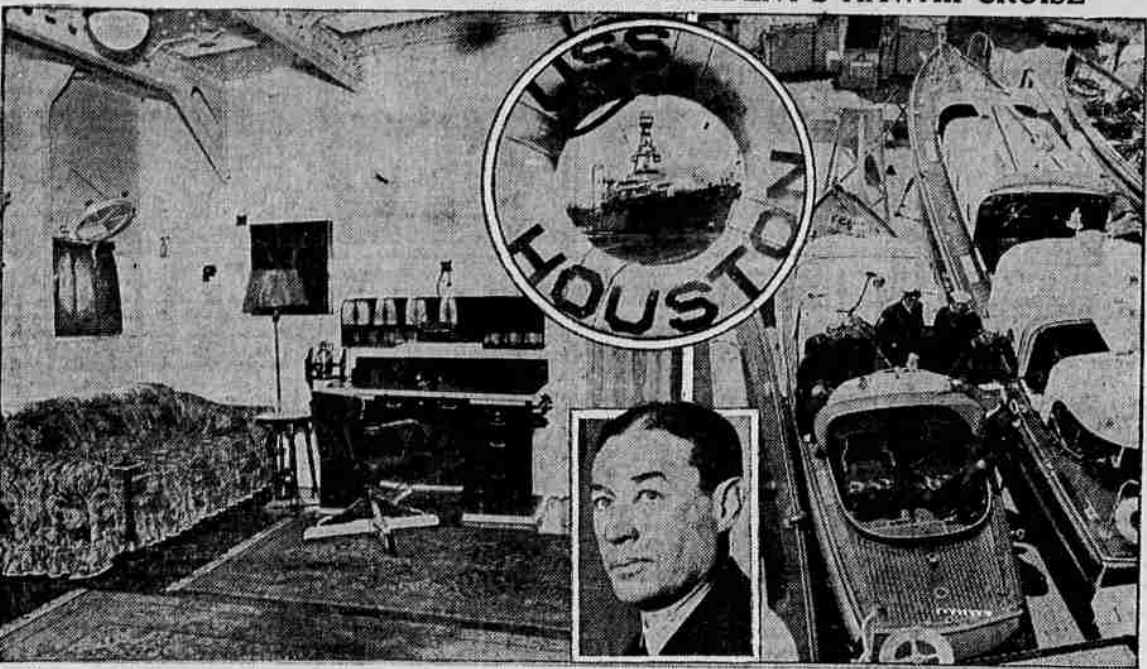
FINAL REHEARSAL ON CHURCH PLAYS

WOODSMEN SIGNED FOR CCC CAMPS IN MEDFORD AREA

Enrollment for 84 experienced woodsmen, to be located in the Civilian Conservation Corps camps at South Fork of the Rogue, Upper Rogue River and Applegate, in the Rogue River National forest, started today at the National Re-employment office in the city hall, under the direction of Lewis Ulrich.

Men interested in positions as experienced woodsmen, may also apply at the Jackson county relief office, and at the forest service office, where Jack Fitzgerald is in charge.

Persons accepting this work, receive \$30 a month, besides food, clothing and shelter, and as a five-day week schedule is being used, it affords the men an opportunity to spend the week-end at home.

Billster ruts camps are now full, and most of the forest service crews have their quotas, according to information received today. Road construction, under the PWA contracts, at Crater Lake is being done by men, most of whom are selected from Klamath and Douglas counties.

Due to the fact that all these divisions of labor are now filled, Mr. Ulrich urged those who are in need of work to take advantage of the forest service employment.

Men are being enrolled for the camps to fill up the quotas which were reduced by the discharge of men completing 15 months with the CCC.

Although a request has been issued by the park service for about 80 men, Mr. Ulrich stated that the unsettled conditions at Crater Lake national park made any employment there indefinite.

COPCO WORKERS SEE MOVIES OF JUBILEE

A cinema review of Oregon's Diamond Jubilee was enjoyed by members of the Copco employees' club at their regular forum meeting held at the Hotel Medford this noon. Two reels of motion pictures taken by Bernard Roberts and Horace Bromley covered the main features of Jubilee week including the pioneer parade, rodeo, agricultural parade and other colorful events.

SLIDE OF PUMICE NOTED IN CRATER

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore.—(Spl.)—Another evidence how time is slowly and patiently changing the appearance of all things, a large slide of pumice occurred recently from the summit of Liso Rock into the waters of Crater Lake, leaving a path of yellow down the face of the high lava cliff. It was first believed a portion of the rock had slipped off, but a thorough investigation disproved this thought.

Through thousands of years which have elapsed since Mt. Mazama, one of the outstanding volcanoes of ancient times, was destroyed, the crater walls have been gradually wearing back as a result of the forces of erosion. The changes have been so slight they cannot be easily noted in a lifetime or in the passage of a century, but in the course of many centuries the changes would be perceptible.

WATCHMAN PEAK STATION OPENED

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore.—(Spl.)—On the summit of the first high point of the west rim of Crater lake, the Watchman observation station is now open to the public, with an attendant in charge. The early opening, nearly one month ahead of last year, was the result of unusually light snowfall of last winter, which brought less than 50 per cent of the winter before.

The station can be reached from the rim road, entailing a walk of less than 20 minutes. The station, one of the most modern ever constructed, not only serves as a vantage point for visitors to gain a complete panorama of the lake and park area, but as a forest fire protective measure as well. The attendant in charge is well versed in the art of fire detection.
