

269 CCC LEAVING ON SPECIAL TRAIN SUNDAY FOR HOME

A special train, which will carry 269 CCC enrollees back to Fort Sheridan, Ill., to be discharged, will leave Medford at 6 o'clock Sunday evening, July 1, CCC district headquarters has announced.

The train will be routed over the Southern Pacific to Ogden, Utah, Denver & Rio Grande Western to Pueblo, Colo.; Missouri Pacific to Kansas City, Mo.; Wabash to Chicago, and thence to Fort Sheridan.

Captain Glen P. Wallace, infantry reserve, will be train commander, and First Lieutenant Wallace S. Douglas, medical reserve, will accompany the train as medical officer. Miss officer will be First Lieutenant Cyril H. McGuire, coast artillery reserve, and the regular army enlisted man is Sgt. Oscar W. Spaulding, ninth field artillery.

The men being discharged have served their 18 months or five quarters as allowed, and are being discharged for that reason. Forty-seven will go from Camp Tye, 30 from Camp Steamboat, 18 from Camp China Flats, 18 from Camp Tiller, 47 from Camp Winoglas, 30 from Camp South Fork of the River, 31 from Camp McKinley, 41 from Camp Hand ranger station, and seven from headquarters detachment at Medford.

GRAND JURY NEAR FINISH OF LABOR

The grand jury, Floyd Ross of Central Point, foreman, resumed its sessions today, following a day's recess to permit the presence of witnesses from outside, including several National Guardsmen, who returned yesterday from the annual encampment at Clatsop.

No indictments have yet been returned. The grand jury is investigating a number of county violations of the Knox liquor law, and minor criminal matters, including the alleged theft of \$40 from a Jacksonville miner, during a visit to a North Pacific highway beer emporium, and criminal libel charges against E. L. Fitch and May Murray, for the distribution of the "Black Political Plot Exposed" pamphlet, in which Jacksonville county courts, jurors, and the state police and district attorney's office were maligned.

\$1000 SETTLES ACCIDENT SUIT

The damage suit of Gerald Pearce, a minor, against Robert Boyd, a high school boy, also a minor, as the result of an auto accident on Sixth street last spring, was ordered dismissed yesterday by Judge H. D. Norton upon a stipulation filed by both litigants through their attorneys and guardians.

Under the terms of the stipulation the plaintiff accepts \$1000 in "full settlement."

It is further provided in the stipulation that in the settlement, "neither of the defendants admits liability, and deny it, and the settlement is made solely to expedite the termination of the litigation."

The plaintiff charged in the suit that Boyd drove recklessly on Sixth street, between Main and Oakdale streets.

The defendant charged that young Pearce ran across the street, without regard to traffic or due caution, and denied the allegation of recklessness.

SISKIYOU PROJECT TALKED AT MEET

ROUTINE MATTERS IN CIRCUIT COURT AFTER SWEENEY SUIT ENDED

Routine legal matters occupied the circuit court today, Judge H. D. Norton presiding. The petit jury was excused temporarily, following conclusion of the damage suit of W. S. Graham against Dr. C. T. Sweeney, with the granting of a non-suit in favor of Dr. Sweeney.

Graham, who sustained a broken leg while working in a mine near Gold Hill, sought \$15,000 damages for alleged negligence and malpractice. That leg was broken between the thigh and the knee.

Evidence adduced showed there was no negligence on the part of Dr. Sweeney; that he used all medical methods for the reduction of the fracture; that the plaintiff was treated by other physicians and no showing made that the condition of Graham today was due to the treatment of Dr. Sweeney. The evidence further showed that after Dr. Sweeney was released from the Graham case an operation was performed by other doctors and a plate was put on the thigh bone to hold it in place, but that the plate pulled loose, and caused further injury.

The court held there was no evidence of malpractice or negligence. The trial lasted two and one-half days. The plaintiff was represented by Attorneys E. E. Kelly and Robert Hammond, Jr., and the defense by Attorneys Charles W. Reames and R. T. Senn of Portland.
