

MOVIES OF FIGHT SHOW PRIMO TOOK TERRIBLE LACING

Wonder Baer Didn't Break Italian's Neck in First Round — Primo's Ankle Alibi Called Bit of Baloney

The two things that impressed me most after seeing the Baer-Carnera brawl all over again in the movies were (1) the outstanding persistence with which Carnera forced the fight, even when he was most badly hurt and kept continually employing the only weapon of his command, a left jab, and (2) the probability that if the Italian man-mountain chipped his ankle bone in the fight at all it happened in either the 8th or 10th rounds, when he was very wobbly and going down in sections.

The pictures clearly substantiate the terrific right-hand beating that the giant absorbed and offer arguments for a return match only on the basis of the consistent courage with which Carnera carried the fight to his heavier-hitting opponent.

Carnera must have landed at least 100 stiff jabs at various parts of Baer's grinning or scowling features, yet altogether they did not do much damage as the first right-hand that dropped Primo in the first round. The difference in the power and leverage behind the blows of the two men is amazingly clear in the movies but the giant's recuperative powers appear equally astonishing.

Strange as it seems by comparison with the actual ring-side evidence, the pictures show Carnera going strong, bobbing effectively and consistently outpointing Baer from the fourth to ninth rounds inclusive. He was only on the floor once in six successive rounds and on that occasion it was from losing his own balance in a futile lunge at the fast-moving Baer.

Injury in Eighth Round

This incident occurred in the eighth round and it may have caused the injury to Primo's right foot. Up to that time he was constantly on his toes, when upright and leading, but thereafter he moved more slowly and employed a more flat-footed stance.

Twice in the 10th round, when he was knocked down, it was obviously becoming a great deal more laborious for the Italian to hold his 263 pounds back to a vertical position.

The pictures absolutely substantiate Referee Arthur Donovan's statement, made to ringers immediately after the fight, that he was influenced in stopping the bout by Carnera's own unwillingness to continue. Clearly revealed is Primo's expressive gesture of spreading his gloves helplessly and looking at Donovan in an appealing manner, as much as to say "There's no use of going on. I've tried everything I know and it's done me no good."

Ill-Advised Alibi

Carnera has been badly advised in placing so much emphasis on his fractured ankle, which he went so far as to assure his countrymen, was the only reason he met defeat and lost the world championship.

Nothing could be more ridiculous. The damage to Primo's under-planning was an effect, not a cause. He was hit so hard by Baer in the first two rounds that he was lucky he didn't also get a broken neck.

Besides, as we have already pointed out, there is no real evidence to substantiate Carnera's claim that the accident happened in the first round. No man with a broken ankle could still bounce around on his toes for eight or nine rounds without the slightest sign of a limp.

He-Match Unnecessary

Alibi are just as much a part of the fight game as the extravagant and reckless statements attributed beforehand to the principals. If all of the excuses made for Carnera were legitimate, he would appear the most unfortunate of all championship victims. But the fact is that most of his bad luck was wrapped up in Baer's fist.

Although it is distinctly possible that a return Baer-Carnera match can be steamed up, either late this season or next spring, I would not expect the Italian to last as long the next time.

Primo would not be able to forget what happened before. There would, in the parlance of the ball game, be

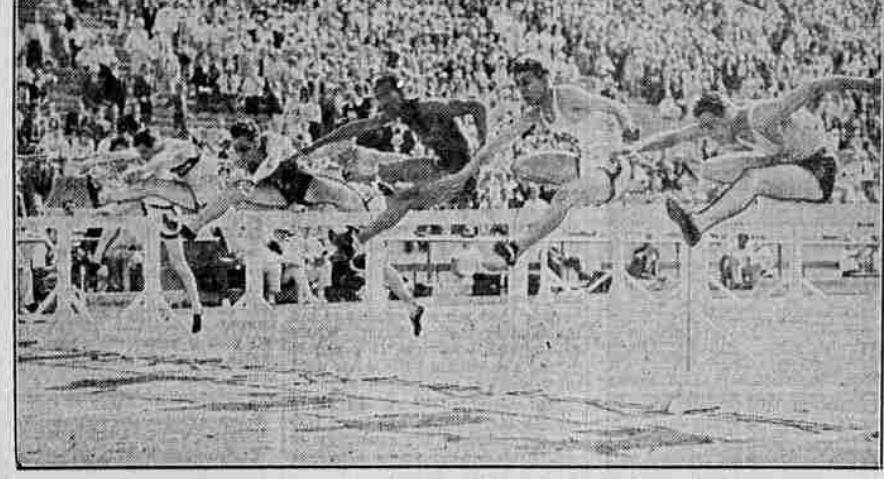

NEW HOMES AND REPAIRS ON OLD TO BE FINANCED

\$8000 mortgage is a 100 per cent asset. It asks the federal housing administrator to insure the mortgage. After investigation and the payment of a fee of not less than one-half of one per cent, the administrator may insure the mortgage. He may even accept it himself and pay the cash to the bank.

No individual mortgage insured may be for longer than 30 years, bear more than 3 per cent interest, or be for more than 80 per cent of the appraised value of the property the day the mortgage is executed. Nor may an insured home mortgage exceed \$10,000. Mortgages also may be insured on new homes.

Another phase of the bill allows the federal housing administrator to insure up to 30 per cent of the total loans made by a bank for modernization and repair.

These loans may be simple per-

sonal notes and for the smaller sums, officials say, they probably will be. No loan in this category could exceed \$2000.

To help the home owner find a market for his mortgage, the bill authorizes the creation of national mortgage associations, which are empowered to rediscount the paper. They must have a \$5,000,000 capital and may have stock outstanding to a total of \$50,000,000.

To encourage depositing in building and loan associations, the bill sets up an insurance system for them. After passing required examinations as to soundness, and paying a minimum of one-fourth of one per cent of held total deposits, these associations may tell any depositor

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LOST RIVER GOLD STRIKE IS 'FLOP'

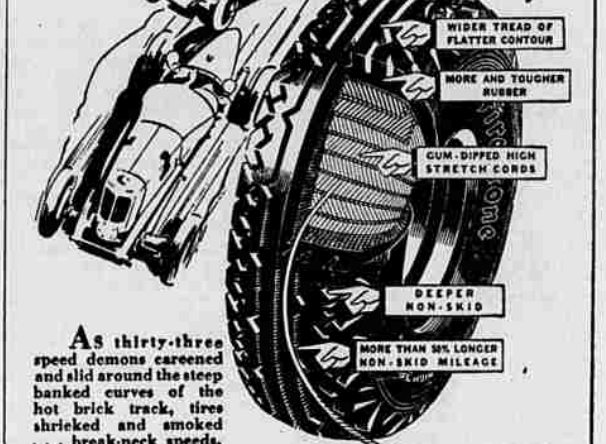
