

DUNNE NOT TO SPEAK AT GRANGERS PICNIC IN ASHLAND JULY 4TH

ASHLAND, June 28.—(Spl.)—Joe E. Dunne, Republican candidate for governor of the state of Oregon, will not be present in Ashland on July Fourth to speak to the Grangers who will assemble here on that day. In a letter to the Ashland Daily Tidings Dunne says:

"Through some source or other, I note in the clippings that are coming to my office the notation that I am to speak at the Grange celebration on July 4, at Ashland or some place adjacent thereto. "Unfortunately, I have never received such an invitation, although I am a Granger of long standing and, in any event, it would be impossible for me to do so because of an engagement to speak at Condon on July 8 and at Bonneville on July 4. I regret keenly that such is the case because I would enjoy being with the Grangers of southern Oregon and had such an invitation been tendered me in time, I would have appreciated the privilege of appearing before them.

"I wonder if you will give due publicity to my letter so that I will not be accused of having failed to appear before the Grange or that they may not have a false impression that I had refused to accept the invitation.

"I hope that all my brothers and sisters of the Grange will have a wonderful time at the picnic and I send to each of them my fraternal greetings."
