After two months of action on foreign fields, the Medford Rogues will finally make their appearance before a home crowd next Sunday when they entertain the Shaw Bertram Lumber Co. team at the Jackson county fairgrounds.

While Medford will be attempting to keep pace with Grants Pass and Shaw Bertram to climb out of the cellar, Ewauna will play host to Grants Pass at Klamath Falls in a game at Modoc field.

Protest Allowed
Ewauna's protest over the Ewauna-Shaw Bertram game on June 7 which Shaw Bertram won by the score of 11-7, has been allowed according to an announcement made by president of the league, A. C. Ninniger of Ashland. The protest is the result of a wrong interpretation of the rules by the umpire-in-chief, who sent an Ewauna runner back to third base who would have scored the winning run, because a catcher on the third base line, ran toward home with the runner, although helping the baserunner in no way nor drawing a throw at home plate. Shaw Bertram finally won out in the eleventh inning. The replay of the game is ordered for July 22, and will be the second game of a double header and limited to seven innings.

McLean for Shaw Bertram
On the mound for Shaw Bertram in their Medford game will be Cliff "Chief" McLean, until last Sunday a member of the Medford team. Friction with the Medford management caused his switch to Shaw Bertram and the Indian will bear down to the utmost to get revenge, which he failed to get last Sunday in fourteen innings. Corsetto will do the Shaw Bertram catching.

Jack Hughes, Paul Hess or Bill Sargent will hurl for the Rogues though it will probably be the first named with Calvert or Dean Joy doing the receiving.

COTTON IS KING IN BRITISH OPEN

SANDWICH, Eng., June 29.—(AP)—Henry Cotton, 27-year-old British professional, today won the British open golf championship with a 72-hole aggregate of 283, tying the record for the tournament created in 1932 by Gene Sarazen.

After setting a record-breaking pace for his first two rounds, with a 67 and a 65, Cotton stuck his third round this morning in par 72, and faltered on the final round, taking a 79. He missed a three-foot putt on the final green in his bid to break Sarazen's record, but his victory nevertheless ended a 10-year winning streak by Americans.

CANZONERI AWARDED TECHNICAL K. O. OVER KLICK IN 9TH FRAME

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—One accurate left hook today had won for Tony Canzoneri another shot at Barney Ross and a chance to regain the lightweight championship.

That one hook raised a huge "mouse" about Frankie Klick's right eye in the fifth round at Ebbets field last night and eventually forced Referee Patay Haley to halt the fight in the ninth and award Canzoneri the victory by a technical knockout.

They had battled fairly evenly to the delight of 13,000 customers through the first four rounds. Early in the fifth, Canzoneri lashed out with a left hook to his San Francisco rival's face. The flesh about Klick's eye puffed up instantly and before the round was over it was completely shut, a black and blue mass. In the eighth another left hook broke the swelling open, and after 142 minutes of fighting in the next round Haley decided to stop the bout, rather than permit the far westerner to chance permanent injury.

Reed Takes Trout With Single Fall

PENDLETON, Ore., June 29.—(P)—Robin Reed, 157 pounds, of Reedsport, won a decision over Sailor Trout, 162, of San Pedro, in the main event wrestling match here last night. Trout was unable to continue after Reed fell on him and knocked him out.

Jack Curtiss, 139 pounds, of San Antonio, won two out of three falls from Don Sugar, 160 pounds, of Salem.

Pioneer Hardware Merchant Passes

SALEM, June 29.—(AP)—Ray L. Farmer, 74, pioneer Salem hardware merchant, died suddenly here Thursday in the basement of his retail store. He had gone to the basement to rest, and there succumbed to a heart attack.

Farmer was the acting proprietor of the oldest continuous retail establishment in Salem, the founding of the business dating back to 1855. He had been connected with the store since 1863.

the policy was by Carter, Rice & Co., and that the policy terminated when Singleton left the employ of the company.

Phil Singleton, whose insurance is referred to above, was killed last August when the oil truck he was driving turned over near Dixonville. He was a former resident of Medford.
