Both New Champions Win By Lopsided Scores On Inland Empire Course—Marian McDougall Defeats Bremerton Star.

SPOKANE COUNTRY CLUB, Spokane, Wash., June 30.—(AP)—The two Puget Sound players who came to the Pacific Northwest amateur golf tournament "for fun" didn't have any frolicking time in the finals today with Ken Storey, the mighty midget of Spokane, and Miss Marian McDougall, sun-bronzed Portland performer, capturing the championships by lopsided scores.

Storey, the littlest guy in the west, won the biggest prize awarded by disposing of Ralph Whaley, Seattle, 9 and 8, while Miss McDougall was conquering Mrs. Don Scott, Bremerton, 8 and 7.

By virtue of their victories, Storey brought the title back to Spokane for the first time in eight years and Miss McDougall gave the Rose City title to the Pacific Northwest amateur golf tournament "for fun" didn't have any frolicking time in the finals today with Ken Storey, the mighty midget of Spokane, and Miss Marian McDougall, sun-bronzed Portland performer, capturing the championships by lopsided scores.

FLERS, France, June 30.—(AP)—Fog, foul weather and fuel shortage ended another brave aerial venture near here today, hundreds of miles short of its goal.

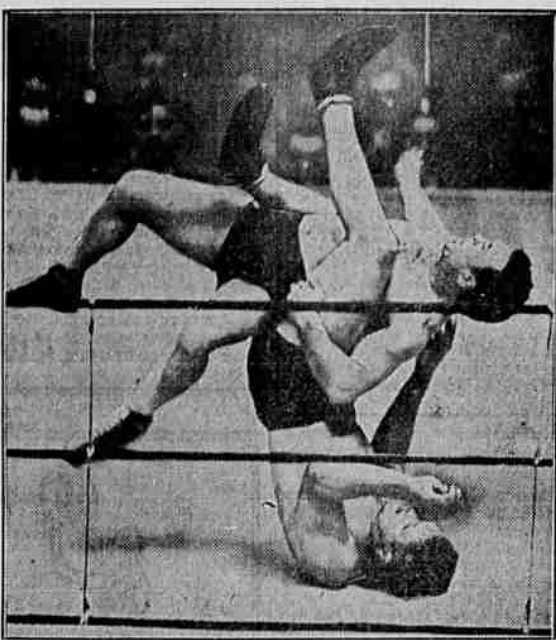

Jimmie Johnson and Gordon Richards, Tacoma pros, played the course today. Johnson had a par-beating 70 for his first trip around.

Professionals entered included Steve Crocket of Salem and Bill Hackney of Klamath Falls. Amateurs entered included George C. Bechler of Woodburn.

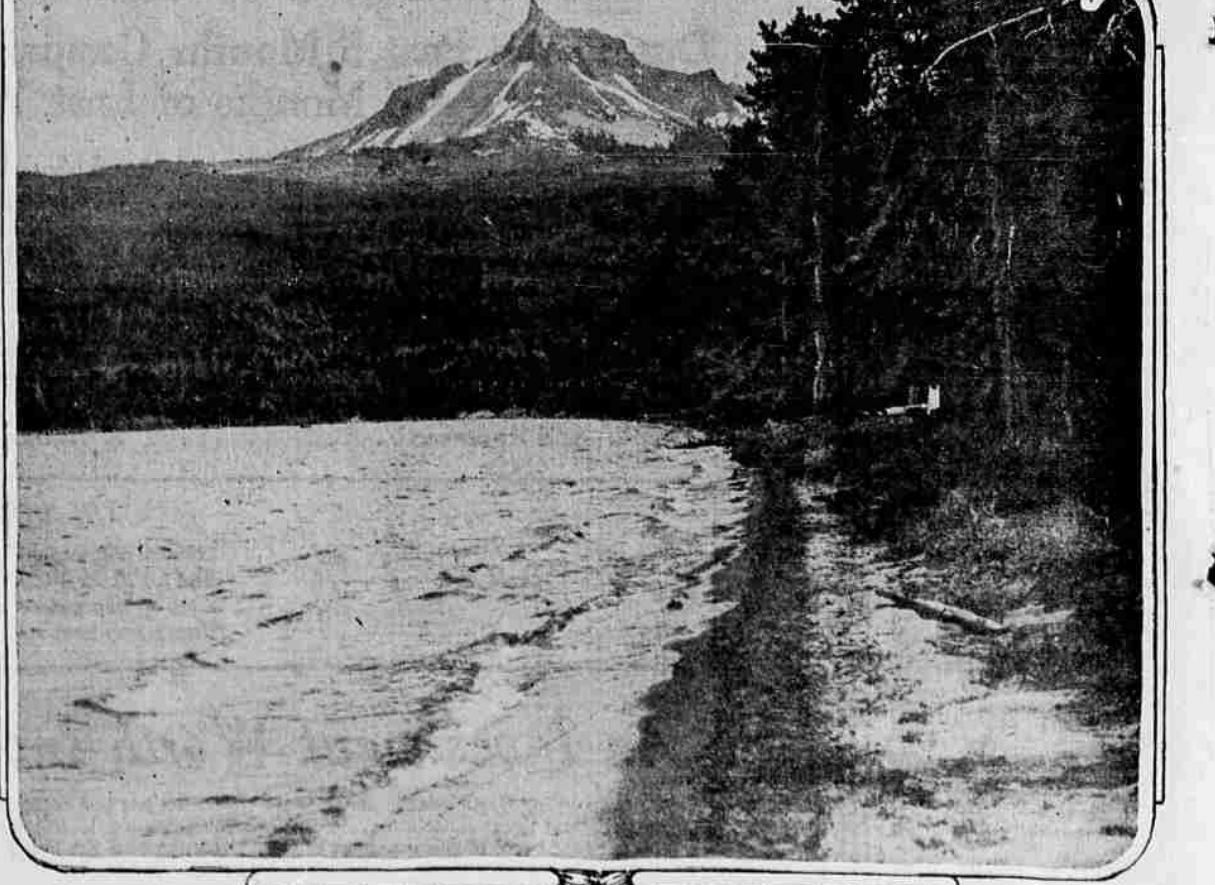
